

Step 3. Once you receive confirmation from FINANCE with a copy of your OF-288 and other financial documentation you are free to complete Step 4 and travel home.

Step 4. Complete Demob Checkout Sheet using QR code on the cover of the IAP. If unable to use, see demob. Once demob receives confirmation from Finance and your demob checkout sheet has been electronically submitted, you will be released in the system.

**\*\*\* Note: AIR TRAVEL** – All resources requiring air travel to their home unit **MUST** notify DEMOB 72 hours in advance of their scheduled departure date in order to schedule flights to their home units.
