Withdrawals are words or acts that are considered hurtful or unkind by the other person. Anytime you marginalize, that is, make someone feel less important than they feel they deserve, you are making a withdrawal from that relationship.

Withdrawals happen. Sometimes justified, but often not. It takes a minimum of five deposits to make up for one withdrawal.
