


# Fire Weather Forecast

**WEATHER DISCUSSION:** A frontal boundary draped across Eastern WA will be the focus for showers and a few thunderstorms on Tuesday. With that comes a 60-70% chance for wetting rains and 15% chance for lightning. Winds will largely come from the south and southeast through the day but will likely waver at times to the southwest with passing showers. Showers will wane by Tuesday evening with drier conditions Tuesday night.

## **TUESDAY:**

**WEATHER:** Mostly cloudy with scattered showers. Slight chance for thunderstorms. Heavier showers will be capable of brief heavy downpours.

**RAINFALL AMOUNTS:** 0.07 – 0.23”

**MAXIMUM TEMPERATURE:** 71-75°

**MINIMUM RELATIVE HUMIDITY:** 55-59%.

### **20-FOOT WINDS:**

- Southeast to south 7 to 10 mph with gusts around 15 mph.
- Winds occasionally shifting to the southwest with brief gusts to 25 mph with passing showers.

**CHANCE OF WETTING RAIN ( $\geq 0.10$ ”):** 65%

**LIGHTNING ACTIVITY LEVEL:** 2

**HAINES INDEX:** 2

**MIXING HEIGHTS/INVERSIONS:** Weak surface inversions (1000 ft AGL) in the morning mixing out near 2200 ft AGL around 1400 hrs.

**AVIATION:** Showers with ceilings largely 4000-6000 feet AGL; heavier showers could produce brief MVFR conditions.

## **TUESDAY NIGHT:**

**WEATHER:** Mostly cloudy with a 15% chance of showers before 2000 becoming partly cloudy and dry.

**RAINFALL AMOUNTS:** T - 0.01”

**MINIMUM TEMPERATURE:** 48-52°

**MAXIMUM RELATIVE HUMIDITY:** 82-85%.

### **20-FOOT WINDS:**

- South 6 to 10 mph becoming south to southwest 8 to 13 mph gusts near 18 mph after 0500 hrs.

**CHANCE OF WETTING RAIN ( $\geq 0.10$ ”):** 0%

**LIGHTNING ACTIVITY LEVEL:** 1

**MIXING HEIGHTS/INVERSIONS:** Weak inversions around 1000 ft AGL.

**EXTENDED OUTLOOK:** A cold front sweeps through early Wednesday morning ushering breezy southwest winds through Wednesday afternoon. Much drier air will arrive with the post-frontal air mass drying humidity levels back near 20-25% despite temperatures only warming into the 70s. A warming trend arrives Thursday and continues into the weekend with temperatures rebounding back to 90 degrees. A disturbance lifting into the area on Friday will bring the next threat for showers and thunderstorm activity with light precipitation amounts.

### FUELS:

**GENERAL:** Primary fuel types are timber with grass understory and scattered riparian areas with aspen stands. Agriculture fields include standing wheat, wheat stubble, and irrigated grass/hay. Timber litter is fluffy. Grasses are mostly to fully cured. Fine fuels are reacting to increased atmospheric moisture with FDFM rising to above critical levels. Heavy fuels remain seasonably dry with 1000-hr fuels estimated at 9% fuel moisture.

Local fire danger index ERC has lowered over the previous 48 hours and continues to trend lower.

### TOPOGRAPHY:

**GENERAL:** The area in and around the fire is generally flat with ~200 feet elevation changes across the landscape. Small rocky ridges, low-lying riparian areas, and small lakes are scattered throughout the fire.

### General/Potential Fire Behavior:

**TODAY:** Limited fire behavior throughout the shift today.

Forecast relative humidity and precipitation should lead to minimal fire perimeter growth potential with moderate fire activity interior. Heavy fuels will continue to consume with light to moderate smoke production. Fire activity (open flame and smoke production) may temporarily increase in response to forecast wind gusts. Spotting potential is greatly reduced today and any fire spread would likely be through conduction only.

### SPECIFIC:

**ALL DIVISIONS:** Limited perimeter spread potential again today. Scattered pockets of interior heat, continued creeping, and smoldering are likely. Ash pits may form as heavy materials consume completely. Fire impacted trees continue to fall creating watch out situations and possible flare ups.

**NIGHT SHIFT:** Limited fire activity will continue until 2000 then minimal activity overnight.

**INITIAL ATTACK:** Assuming no measurable precipitation is received and under general forecast weather conditions utilize “head fire” information in the table above for estimates of anticipated fire behavior.

### AIR OPERATIONS:

Low clouds and shower activity may limit aviation use through mid-day. Minimal smoke impacts.

### SAFETY:

*Ash Pits* – Watch for areas of fluffy white ash as deep holes may be hidden underneath. Watch for white ash to turn black with precipitation, any areas that turn white again may indicate residual heat in that area.

The culture of wildland firefighting is steeped in history and tradition, some good, some bad. Unfortunately, we have had to develop many of our policies after the death of firefighters. The National Fallen Firefighters Foundation has developed the “EVERYONE GOES HOME” program. There is a list of 16 Life Safety Initiatives. There is a lot of information! In today’s safety message we will focus on just a few safety culture behaviors.

- **DRIVING:** Everyone in the cab needs to be looking out for hazards. Drivers: pay attention follow the rules of the road! If you aren’t the driver, study the route, be a co-pilot not a backseat driver!
- **LEADERS:** Give relevant operational briefings before engaging the work. Read the IRPG Operational Leadership Principles. Go ahead, do it now, I can wait..
- **CREW MEMBERS:** Seek a mentor. Develop a strong work ethic by working hard, smiling, and caring more about your buddies wellbeing than your own.
- **PROFESSIONALISM:** Your words and actions reflect your character. You represent every firefighter out here. Be proud of that and be nice.
- **LEARN AND TRAIN:** Be a student of not just fire but the human interactions within the fire environment. Pay attention!
- **SEEK OUT THE OLD SALTY FIREFIGHTERS FOR SOME HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE:** You don’t know where you’re going, until you know where you came from.
- **GIVE ATTENTION TO YOUR PERSONAL LIFE:** As you head home remember to re-enter life a bit slower with patience and care. De-stress using healthy techniques.

# Human Resources Message



## Coping With Stress

- **Take breaks from watching, reading, or listening to news stories,** including those on social media. It's good to be informed but hearing about the traumatic event constantly can be upsetting. Consider limiting news to just a couple of times a day and disconnecting from phone, tv, and computer screens for a while.
- **Take care of yourself.** Eat healthy, exercise, get plenty of sleep, and give yourself a break if you feel stressed out.
- **Take care of your body.**
  - Take deep breaths, stretch, or meditate.
  - Try to eat healthy, well-balanced meals.
  - Exercise regularly.
  - Get plenty of sleep.
  - Avoid excessive alcohol, tobacco, and substance use.
  - Continue with routine preventive measures.
- **Make time to unwind.** Try to do some other activities you enjoy.
- **Talk to others.** Talk with people you trust about your concerns and how you are feeling. Share your problems and how you are feeling and coping with a parent, friend, counselor, doctor, or pastor.
- **Connect with your community- or faith-based organizations.**
- **Avoid drugs and alcohol.** These may seem to help, but they can create additional problems and increase the stress you are already feeling.
- **Recognize when you need more help.** If problems continue or you are thinking about suicide, talk to a psychologist, social worker, or professional counselor.

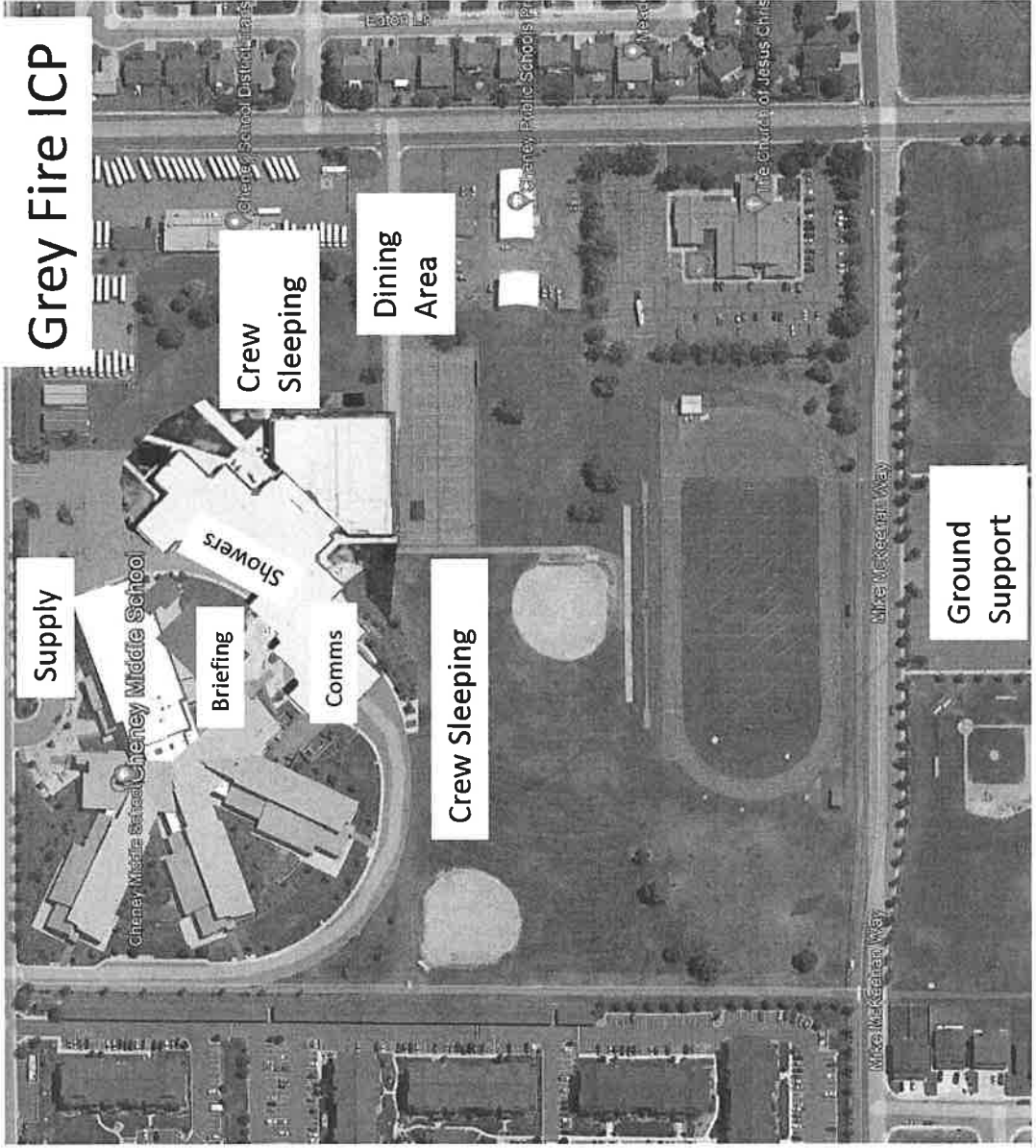

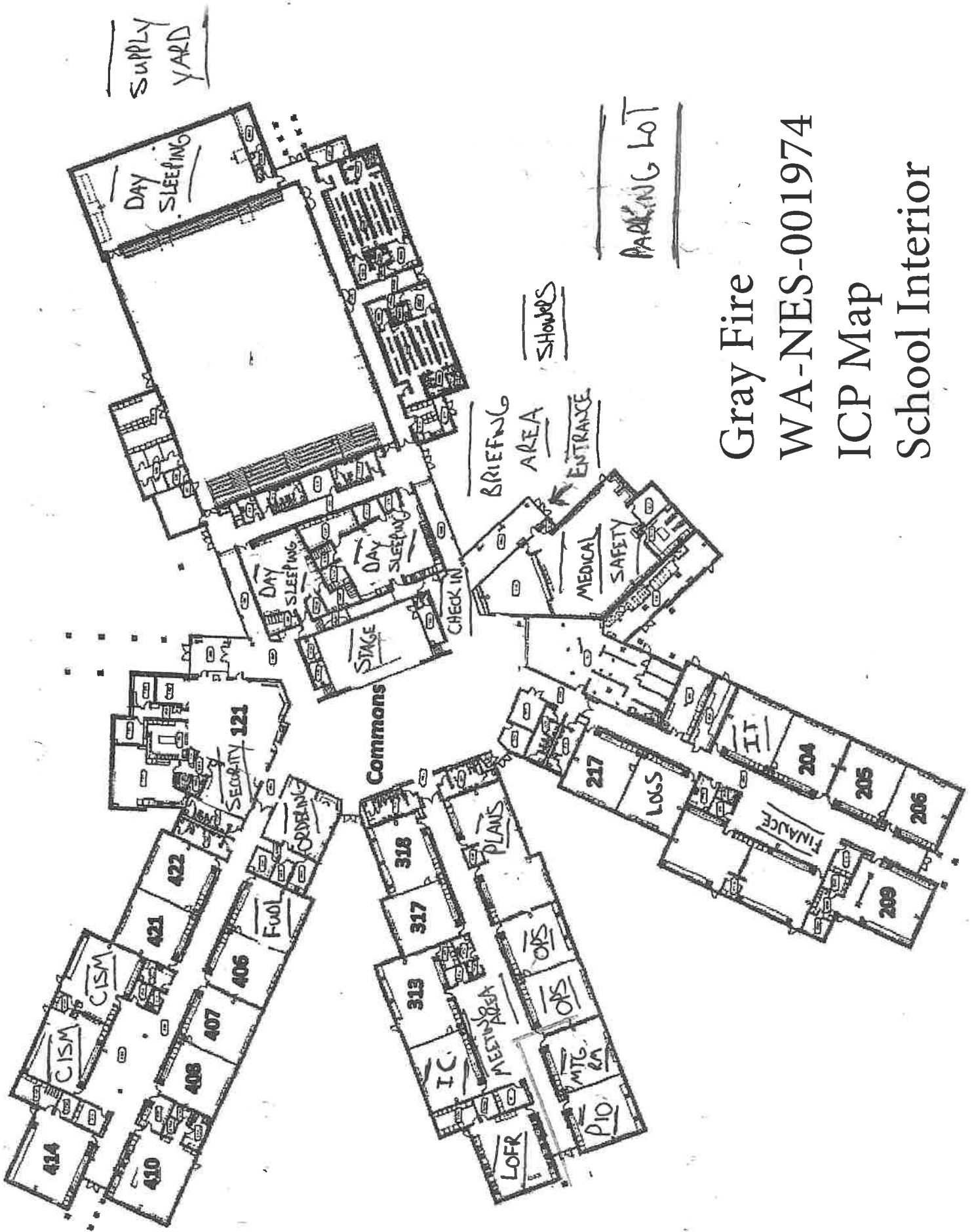
