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**WEATHER DISCUSSION:** A ridge of high pressure will begin to build over the area today promoting a warming and drying trend. Temperatures will rebound back into the 80s with humidity levels trending 5 to 8% drier than Wednesday. Winds will be light through the day starting off from the southeast and slowly turning to the northeast.

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### **THURSDAY:**

**WEATHER:** Mostly sunny.

**MAXIMUM TEMPERATURE:** 80-83°

**MINIMUM RELATIVE HUMIDITY:** 23-26%.

**20-FOOT WINDS:**

- Southeast 1 to 4 mph...becoming northeast in the late afternoon 4 to 9 mph.

**CHANCE OF WETTING RAIN ( $\geq 0.10''$ ):** 0%

**LIGHTNING ACTIVITY LEVEL:** 1

**HAINES INDEX:** 4 (1 – stability, 3 – dryness component)

**MIXING HEIGHTS/INVERSIONS:** Moderate to strong surface inversion in the morning from 500-1700 ft AGL. Inversions mixing out 1200-1300 to heights reaching heights near 5000 ft by 1500 hrs.

**AVIATION:** Little no impact to aviation through Thursday night with light winds and mostly clear skies. Some haze possible from area wildfires. Potential for thicker smoke to sag into Washington from BC fires on Friday.

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### **THURSDAY NIGHT:**

**WEATHER:** Mostly clear.

**MINIMUM TEMPERATURE:** 49-53°

**MAXIMUM RELATIVE HUMIDITY:** 65-70%.

**20-FOOT WINDS:**

- Northeast 2 to 6 mph increasing 6 to 10 mph near sunrise.

**CHANCE OF WETTING RAIN ( $\geq 0.10''$ ):** 0%

**LIGHTNING ACTIVITY LEVEL:** 1

**MIXING HEIGHTS/INVERSIONS:** Moderate to strong surface inversions around 500 ft AGL.

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**EXTENDED OUTLOOK:** A ridge of high pressure will remain over the region through the weekend. This will promote warming temperatures with afternoon highs climbing back into the 90s by the weekend and into early next week. This pattern will allow thicker smoke to drift southward from British Columbia and could reach the fire area Friday into Saturday. Smoke forecasts are very challenging and carry low confidence. A weak wave lifting into the region Friday will bring increasing clouds and a 10-20% chance for showers and thunderstorms in the afternoon. Roughly 70% of the medium range models advertise a ridge break down Tuesday-Wednesday delivering gusty winds and next threat for showers and thunderstorms.

### FUELS:

**GENERAL:** Primary fuel types are timber with grass understory and scattered riparian areas with aspen stands. Agriculture fields include standing wheat, wheat stubble, and irrigated grass/hay. Timber litter is fluffy. Grasses are mostly to fully cured. Fine fuels have reacted to recent precipitation and FDFM is lowering but remains above critical levels. Heavy fuels remain seasonably dry with 1000-hr fuels estimated at 10% fuel moisture.

Local fire danger index ERC is near the 70<sup>th</sup> percentile and is trending level.

### TOPOGRAPHY:

**GENERAL:** The area in and around the fire is generally flat with ~300 feet elevation changes across the landscape. Small rocky ridges, low-lying riparian areas, and small lakes are scattered throughout the fire.

### General/Potential Fire Behavior:

**TODAY:** Spread potential will remain low through mid-day. Conditions that support surface spread are likely to occur between 1500 and 2000 hours. Moderated flame lengths and rates of spread are likely with low resistance to suppression efforts. Heavy fuels will continue to consume with light to moderate smoke production.

Much of the current fire footprint has been on the landscape for 7 days and current external perimeter is approximately 50 miles. (Perimeter does not include I-90 corridor or many interior green islands).

### SPECIFIC:

**ALL DIVISIONS:** Numerous pockets of interior heat, continued creeping, and smoldering are likely. Fire impacted trees may fall and cause flare ups and/or damage infrastructure. Dense vegetation around riparian areas, matted grasses, and ground fuels (sub-terrain) may conduct heat while making detection difficult. Watch your footing as ash pits may still be present throughout the fire area.

**NIGHT SHIFT:** Late-day fire activity will likely continue until 2000 then minimal activity overnight. Relative humidity will rise above 30% soon after sunset, reducing spread potential. Heavy fuels will continue to smolder through the evening.

### AIR OPERATIONS:

Expect minimal fire behavior/smoke impacts to aviation use throughout the day.

### SAFETY:

A fire characteristics chart is a graph that presents primary related fire behavior characteristics—rate of spread, flame length, fireline intensity, and heat per unit area. It helps communicate and interpret modeled or observed fire behavior.

## COMBATting COMPLACENCY WITH INTENTIONALITY

First, thank you all for your exceptional safety record. The Gray Fire continue to stretch us in every aspect of firefighting due to the challenges mopping up a fire impacted community. Everyone is being asked to step up and work in ways that may not be familiar to many of us. Now that the fire front has passed and we move toward incident stabilization the fire environment can start to feel familiar. As this marathon continues it is important to remember the temptation to let our guard down. This can lead to **COMPLACENCY**. Just because we have had rain and cooler weather yesterday, the fire activity may pick up again. There is still potential and some of the hazards might be hard to identify easily. (Working among residents, working with and among utility workers, HAZ MAT, unstable chimneys, partially collapsed walls, etc...). **Fatigue, thinking of home, stress and working long hours can all factor into the reason for the next accident, injury or illness.** To be successful in meeting our incident objectives we all need to be resilient and **INTENTIONAL**. In the Incident Command System each section has their own area of expertise and has to be at the top of their game. That being said, everyone plays a role in the success of the team. Here are some tips for staying engaged and finishing strong:



- ✓ **DUTY RESPECT** and **INTEGRITY** in your actions, words, and behavior. We are **ALL** ambassadors for the Fire Service!
- ✓ **FOCUSED AND FLEXIBLE:** Pay attention to details and expect there to be a few barriers pop up along the way. We are problem solvers not quitters.
- ✓ **MAINTAIN YOUR HEALTH** Quality rest, nutrition, and mindfulness. Check in with your friends and family back home. Thank them for supporting you so you can focus on this fire.
- ✓ **DRIVE INTENTIONALLY** and **DEFENSIVE**. Just because you are familiar with the travel routes does not give you the right to drive fast. PLEASE SLOW DOWN AND LOOK OUT FOR THE PUBLIC, Maintain your vehicles. Let's keep our mechanics bored! Plus, nobody likes paperwork.
- ✓ **COMMUNICATE, COMMUNICATE, COMMUNICATE** There are lots of ways to complete the communications feedback loop. Be quick to listen and slow to speak.

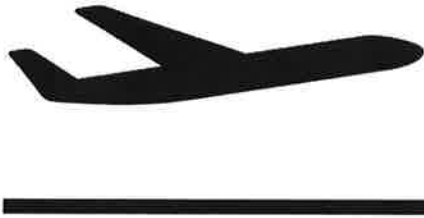
