WEATHER DISCUSSION:

A shallow cold front will have moved south over the I-25 corridor Thursday early morning, with easterly winds starting to creep into the foothills through mid-morning. The colder and wetter airmass will continue deepening through the day, to reach into the upper elevations by late afternoon. It's been so dry that it will likely take until mid-evening for the airmass to moisten up enough for snow to reach the ground. Expect areas of light snow to occur through Thursday night into Friday morning, with 1-3" of accumulation. Another push from the north and east Friday will bring colder air and additional light snow, for another 1-2" of accumulation. Additional periods of snow are expected through Saturday, before a ridge pushes in for warmer and drier conditions Sunday. Winds will become WNW over the fire, increasing Sunday and especially Monday when gusts may be in the 35-45 mph range.

THURSDAY:

WEATHER: Mostly cloudy and much colder.

MAX TEMPERATURES: 25-34° F above 8kft / 32-38° F below 8kft.

MIN HUMIDITY: 40-55% above 8kft / 35-45% below 8kft (this minimum will occur in the 0600-0900 time frame).

20 FT WINDS:

W SIDE (above 8kft, mainly west of Red Feathers to Signal Mtn): WSW 5-8 mph with gusts to 12 mph until 1100, becoming light and variable until 1500, then E 6-10 mph.

E SIDE (below 8kft, mainly east of Red Feathers to Signal Mtn): W down-drainage 3-6 mph with gusts to until 0900, then light and variable until noon, then E 4-7 mph.

HAINES INDEX: 2. **LAL:** 1 **CHC of PCPN:** 5% **CWR:** 0%

STABILITY/INVERSION: Little to no inversion.

THURSDAY NIGHT:

WEATHER: Increasing clouds. Areas of light snow after 1900. Snow accumulation up to 2 inches.

Minimum temperatures: 19-27° F valleys and high ridges / 22-28° F mid slopes.

Maximum RH: 30-45% above 8kft / 20-30% below 8kft.

WINDS: W SIDE (above 8kft, mainly west of Red Feathers to Signal Mtn): E 4-7 mph with gusts 12 mph.

E SIDE (below 8kft, mainly east of Red Feathers to Signal Mtn): W 4-8 mph with gusts to 14 mph until midnight, then light and variable, becoming E 3-5 mph towards sunrise.

OUTLOOK FOR FRIDAY:

COLDER, PERIODS OF LIGHT SNOW.

WEATHER: Areas of light snow, diminishing in the afternoon. Snow accumulation up to 2 inches.

MAX TEMPS: 18-24° F above 8kft / 22-28° F below 8kft.

MIN TEMPS: 14-20° F

When can I get tested?

TESTING WILL END AT 2000 on Friday 12-11-2020

Oh my gosh I am leaving after the testing is no longer being done. What should I do?

Still get a test before Friday 12-11-2020 even if you are leaving after the COVID19 tests are no longer being provided by the incident, and still abide by all COVID19 prevention techniques.

Will I be notified with the results?

If you test positive to COVID19 through a test on this incident you WILL be notified by phone.

If you test negative you will not be notified.

How long will it take to get result back from my test?

Right now it takes approximately 24 hours to receive results.

If I do not receive information from my test can I find out if I tested negative for COVID19?

Yes. The lab that processes the tests will have record of the results of your test and you can call the Arapaho & Roosevelt National Forests Safety Manager to request them.
