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

## FUELS:

**Division A** – The fuels consist of open stands of juniper at the lower elevations transitioning to more Ponderosa Pine with scattered Aspen groves at the higher elevations. Sagebrush and short grass along with pockets of heavy dead and down can be found on the surface.

**Division Z** – The fuels consist of a mixed stand of Subalpine Fir, Lodgepole, Ponderosa and Aspen with heavy loads of dead and down material on the surface. In the open areas, sagebrush and grass are present. Grasses and forbs can be found along Cow Creek.

Scattered areas of dead standing timber can be found on both divisions

The current ERC-Y is at the 84<sup>th</sup> percentile, down from yesterday, but still above average for this time of year. The last live fuel moisture measured in Sagebrush was 122%, and the 100- and 1000-fuel moisture content are at 13% and 12% respectively. At these moistures, expect the Sagebrush and heavy fuels to contribute to fire intensity

## FIRE BEHAVIOR:

### General:

Cooler temperatures and higher relative humidity will keep fire behavior to a minimum. Unburned pocket of fuel will continue to burn out on Division A. Surface fire with an occasional torching tree may be observed as this happens. Other areas of the fire will see minimal fire behavior, mainly creeping and smoldering in the heavy fuels.

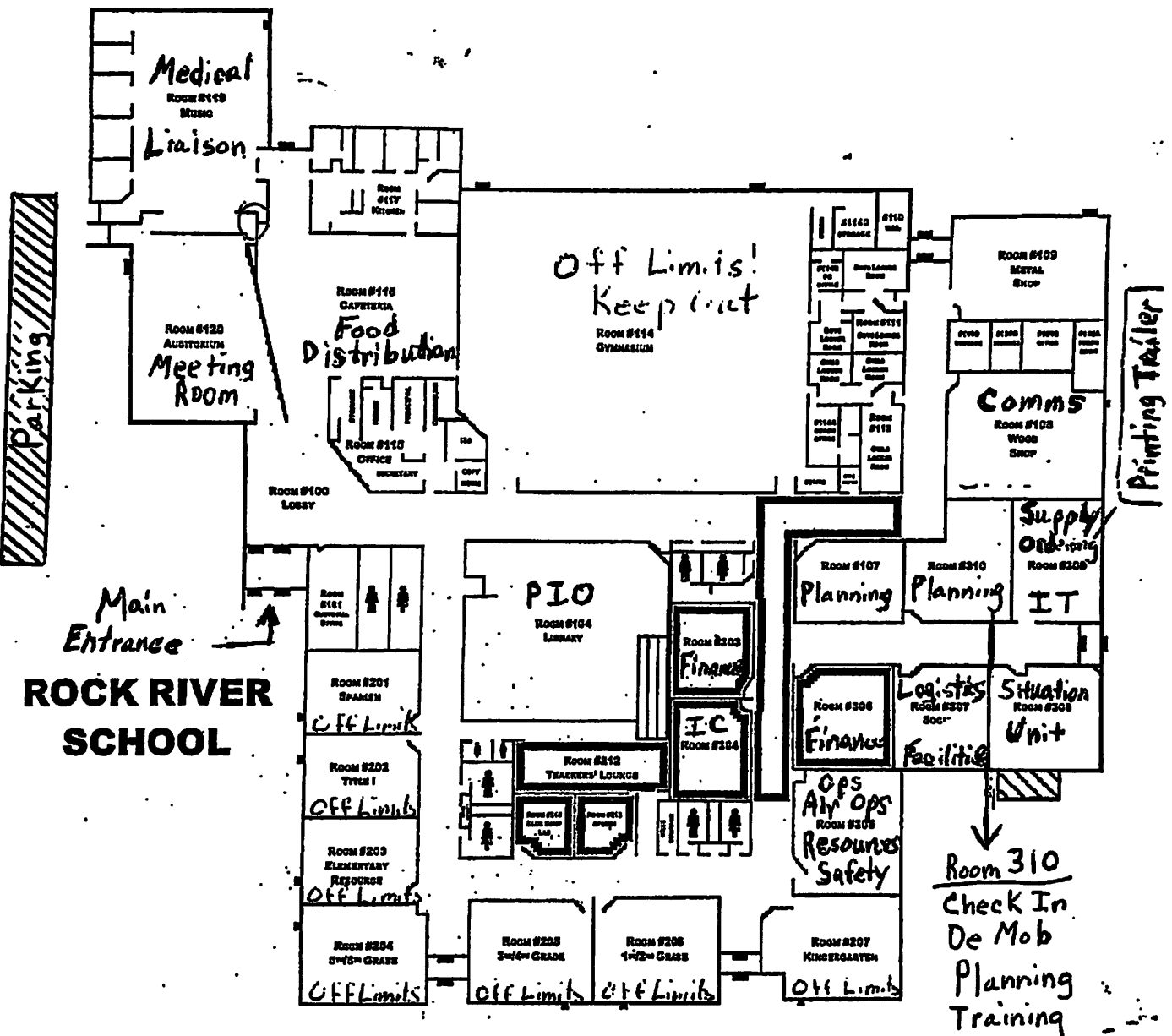
