

**FUELS:** Primary fuels are Ponderosa Pine with litter and oakbrush understory. Grassy areas are still mostly green and generally will not support fire spread. Fire Indices are near average for this time of year. Oakbrush will burn as will the downed woody fuels and timber litter when exposed to the sun.

### *Outputs*

**GENERAL:**

Conditions today are similar to yesterday but humidity will bottom out around the 30 percent level. Fuels will be fairly wet from the rains yesterday but low foliar moisture in the timber will remain. Mixing heights indicate more stable conditions that should inhibit both fire growth and the developing thunderstorms.

**FIRE BEHAVIOR:**

With the precipitation on the fire Friday and high overnight humidity recovery over that last couple of days, the potential active burning period will be limited today. Limited fire behavior and that activity will mostly involve the heavy downed woody fuels. Very low rates of spread are possible but not likely. The heavy woody fuels are still very dry and will continue to burn out in the absence of more rain.

**AIR OPERATIONS:**

Thunderstorm activity in the area may limit air operations in the afternoon today.

**SAFETY:**

**Situational Awareness** is a continuous process that is best accomplished with group input. Invariably others will recognize factors that you may overlook, and communication will be key. Use all your available tools to gather information to increase yours and your crews' awareness.

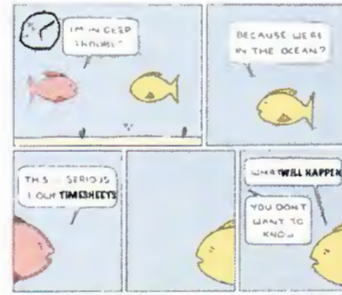

- Take Care of yourself and those you work with**

When was the last time you went fishing, spent quality time with family and friends, got lost in a daydream, or whatever it is you enjoy doing? This fire season is setting up to be a challenging one, and you may already be experiencing significant stressors. All stress reactions are normal. It is more important to acknowledge stress reactions as normal and the importance of managing them through self-care and peer support. Taking care of yourself now enables you to be effective through what will be a long fire season.

Self-care is not an indulgence it is a discipline. It requires tough mindedness and a deep understanding of your personal priorities. If you are not in a place of mindful bliss at least at some point during the day you are not practicing self-care.

- **Self-care is** – saying “no” to something that you don’t want to, even if people will become upset.
- **Self-care is** – letting other people take care of themselves.
- **Self-care is** – taking care of what really matters you.

Be honest with yourself and your family with open communication about your need for and the importance of self-care.
