<b>3. Objective(s):</b> <u>Firefighter and Public Safety</u> Safety of firefighters and the public will be the highest priority throughout all phases of the Incident. Manage the risk to firefighters and the public by utilizing a risk-based approach to decision making. Ensure quality tradeoff conversations occur with Agency Administrators, partners, and stakeholders.	
<u>Protection of Values at Risk</u> Utilize appropriate fire strategies to minimize fire impacts to critical community infrastructure, private lands and improvements, to reduce the potential for adverse health, social, financial, and economic hardships. These include:	
Trail Springs: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Snow Angel Ranch / private land 4 miles southeast of the fire.</li> <li>Piedra Valley Ranch 4 miles to the northeast.</li> <li>Outfitter hunter camp(s) 1 mile north of the fire. Long-term impacts to outfitter and guide businesses.</li> <li>Keep fire east of the West Fork Devil Creek.</li> <li>Public access to the forest for hunting and other recreational opportunities.</li> </ul>	
Mill Creek 2: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>Wolf Creek Ski Area 12 miles.</li> <li>Private land 2 miles west of the fire.</li> <li>Private lands and infrastructure in Cimarrona Ranch subdivisions.</li> <li>Smoke impacts to local communities and US Highway 160 and US Highway 84.</li> <li>San Juan Lineage Cutthroat trout populations in Rio Blanco drainage.</li> <li>Long-term impacts to outfitter and guide businesses.</li> <li>Public access to the forest for hunting and other recreational opportunities.</li> </ul>	
<u>Information and Relationships</u> Maintain and enhance relationships with cooperators, stakeholders, the local community and adjoining agencies through effective, honest, and timely communication, engagement and information sharing. Implement strategies that minimize the impact of smoke to sensitive areas and receptors by adjusting tactics, monitoring smoke impacts, and following guidance in State smoke management plans and coordinating with State and Local Air Quality Control Commission.	
<b>4. Operational Period Command Emphasis:</b>	
Manage risk to firefighters by ensuring hazards are identified, assessed, and where possible mitigated. Be prepared to accept residual risk when short- or long-term risk reduction to values is possible and the probability of achieving objectives is high.	
Utilize strategies and tactics that commit responders only to operations where and when they can be successful, and under conditions where important values at risk are protected, or their future risk reduced, with an acceptable level of responder risk incurred.	
Continue to scout for indirect opportunities and begin to prep and reinforce existing control features consisting of FSR 630 and other system trails where firefighters can be successful. Coordinate any future aerial and ground ignitions as appropriate with holding resources, notifying IC and OSC of timelines and progress. Patrol specific areas to provide an adequate public presence.	
Communicate with local landowners, affected utilities, and County stakeholders regarding Incident strategies, tradeoffs, and seek input into strategies.
