Leaders Intent: Protect human life. Firefighter and public safety will be given the highest priority at all times. Risks to firefighters and the public will be managed utilizing a risk-based approach to decision making.

Incident Objectives:

- Keep firefighters risk at reasonable levels necessary to meet objectives through aggressive risk management.
- Minimize negative impacts of identified values, utilizing point protection and full suppression strategies and area closures.
- Protect sensitive habitats and cultural resources by limiting fire suppression activity that may cause adverse impacts. Probabilities analysis and mitigation strategy identified.
- Provide for Public information using all available distribution methods, including social media options.
- Mop up to the extent necessary to lessen the likelihood of escape. Administrators informed and engaged on process.
- Maintain positive working relationships with the community, cooperators, and incident personnel.
- Observe fire progression in relation to M.A.P.S. provided in the long term management strategy, take action as necessary

General Situational Awareness:

Steep and rugged terrain, critically dry and receptive fuel beds, active area for fire history and drought stressed trees.

.DISCUSSION...

Dry and warm conditions are expected through the short term for the burn area, with the hottest day over the next 7 days forecast to be tomorrow, Friday. In addition, overnight RH recovery tomorrow night into Saturday is expected to be very poor, so enhanced fire activity may have an earlier start on Saturday. A chance for some precipitation returns to the area starting Tuesday.

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Steep winding roads are throughout the incident. Slow down when driving on loose gravel and blind curves. Drive defensively with headlights on and use hands free devices.

Working on steep, uneven terrain. Be mindful of rolling materials.

Ensure radios are properly programmed for today's IAP and that crews are trained in communications procedures for the incident.

Maintain situational awareness. Look up, Look down, Look around

Stay hydrated!!! Time to think = time to drink. Document rest and hydration on 214.

Remain mindful of what is going on around you! LCES!

HEADS UP!!! Lookout for SNAGS when working around areas with burned trees. Evaluate all wind damaged trees with large limbs before working under around them.

Avoid complacency!!!! Experiencing extreme fire behavior due to low live and dead fuel moistures, persistent drought, and elevated fire danger rating values.

Be Deliberate in you risk assessment and mitigations

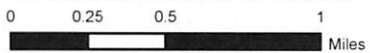

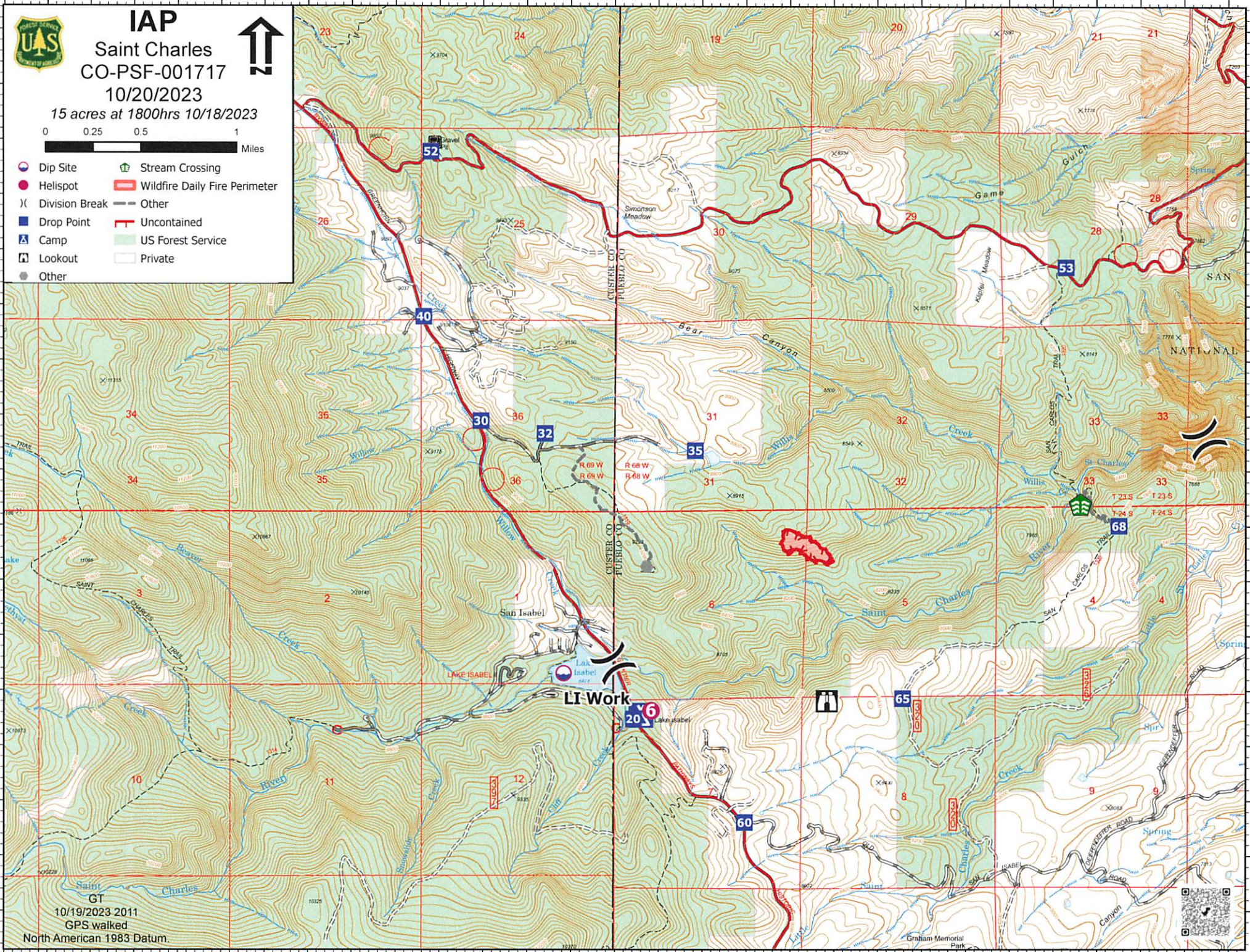
