Leaders Intent: Protect human life. Firefighter and public safety will be given the highest priority at all times. Risks to firefighters and the public will be managed utilizing a risk-based approach to decision making.

Incident Objectives:

- Keep firefighters risk at reasonable levels necessary to meet objectives through aggressive risk management.
- Minimize negative impacts of identified values, utilizing point protection and full suppression strategies and area closures.
- Protect sensitive habitats and cultural resources by limiting fire suppression activity that may cause adverse impacts. Probabilities analysis and mitigation strategy identified.
- Provide for Public information using all available distribution methods, including social media options.
- Mop up to the extent necessary to lessen the likelihood of escape. Ensure administrators are informed and engaged on process.
- Maintain positive working relationships with the community, cooperators, and incident personnel.
- Observe fire progression in relation to M.A.P.S. provided in the long term management strategy, take action as necessary

General Situational Awareness:

Steep and rugged terrain, critically dry and receptive fuel beds, active area for fire history and drought stressed trees.

.DISCUSSION...

An upper low pressure system to the South will pass by to the East on Wednesday, allowing for stronger West to Southwest flow aloft to settle in across the area. Plan on plenty of sun and warm temperatures for the fire area on Wednesday, with stronger winds pushing in during the evening and continuing into Thursday. Low RH levels will return to the area for Thursday.

- **Extended Medical Extraction Times** – In the event of an accident or injury, expect long ground extraction times.
- **Cumulative Fatigue** – Take care to personally mitigate your cumulative fatigue.

*Fire Order for the Day:***#2 Know what your fire is doing at all times.**

- ✓ **Do you have look-outs posted?**
- ✓ **Have you been briefed?**
- ✓ **Do you have a current weather forecast?**
- ✓ **Have you established good communications?**
- ✓ **Is Leader's intent clear?**

NARRATIVE:**SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS:**

- The primary mission for the IMT is **fire suppression and incident stabilization** to reduce fire-related impacts on the communities and resources the agencies protect.
- At all times, the **safety of firefighters and the public** must be your primary objective.
- Implement strategies and tactics where important **values at risk are protected with the least responder exposure necessary.**
- Ensure firefighters who engage in structure protection are **staying within their tactical training, capabilities, and agency policy.**
- On private lands, the protection of forest resources is second only to the preservation of life.

Remember...


- Avoid strategies and tactics that **transfer risk** from one resource to another when the transfer does not increase the likelihood of a successful outcome.
- **Stop, Think, Talk...then Act**, in response to any situation that may represent unnecessary exposure.
- **Take care of each other.** Create a respectful work environment for all incident personnel.
- **Fight complacency.** It's up to each of us to control and eliminate complacency.

FOR A NON-EMERGENCY INCIDENT, WORK THROUGH CHAIN OF COMMAND TO REPORT AND TRANSPORT INJURED PERSONNEL AS NECESSARY.

FOR A MEDICAL EMERGENCY: IDENTIFY ON-SCENE INCIDENT COMMANDER BY NAME AND POSITION AND ANNOUNCE "MEDICAL EMERGENCY" TO INITIATE RESPONSE FROM IMT COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH.

Ex: "Communications, I have a Red priority patient, unconscious, struck by a falling tree. Requesting air ambulance to Forest Road 1 at (Lat./Long.) This will be the Trout Meadow Medical, IC is TFLD Jones. EMT Smith is providing medical care."
