Ensure firefighter and public safety through adherence to all safety standards, maintaining situational awareness and appropriate implementation of evacuations, closures, and temporary flight restrictions. 2. Protect / minimize threats / loss to private investments; key cultural features as listed in the Delegation of Authority; and protect the integrity of the Okefenokee Wilderness. 3. Manage the fires within the swamp under a containment strategy in accordance with suppression actions outlined in the WFSA. Contain the fire within the Swamp Perimeter Road; South and west of Hwy. 1 and the CSX Railroad line; and east of the Swamp Road. 4. Provide accurate and timely information to agencies, stakeholders, and the public through public meetings, news releases, website updates, reports, meetings and personal contacts. 5. Manage the incident cost effectively and in an efficient manner to contain the fire within the acres and cost prescribed by the WFSA. 6. Manage any ongoing and future road and fireline rehab work. Document upland habitats that require restoration work, and provide that documentation to the ESR-BAER Group Team Leader promptly.

WEATHER DISCUSSION:

A very hot and dry airmass will spread across the area today. An onshore flow will develop on Monday, with slightly cooler conditions expected along with the possibility of isolated showers and thunderstorms in the afternoon and early evening.

WEATHER FORECAST SUNDAY:

...CRITICAL RELATIVE HUMIDITY VALUES EXPECTED THIS AFTERNOON...

WEATHER: VERY HOT. Sunny with possibly a few cumulus clouds developing in the afternoon.

MAX TEMPERATURES: Around 100. (24 hour trend = up 2 degree)

MIN HUMIDITY: 22 to 27 percent (24 hour trend = down 5 percent)

20 FT WINDS: West to northwest 2 to 5 mph, increasing to 4 to 8 mph with gusts to 14 mph by 1100, then shifting southeast after 1700.

STABILITY/INVERSION: Mixing heights around 8500 ft.

Dispersion Index 60. Haines Index 5.

TRANSPORT WINDS: West-northwest 12 mph.

WEATHER FORECAST SUNDAY NIGHT:

WEATHER: Clear.

MIN TEMPERATURES: Low around 69.

MAX HUMIDITY: Recovery 90 to 95 percent.

SPECIFIC FIRE BEHAVIOR:			
<p>All Divisions: We had a very good drying day yesterday and another one on tap today, with Rh's in the mid to low 20's. Add good ventilation numbers, and the only good news (almost) is continued, relatively light winds. The result is active to very active fire behavior with rates of spread and flame lengths significantly higher than yesterday (close to double). Additionally, fire intensity and probability of ignition indicate increased resistance to control. Among the other things that will accompany the hotter and drier conditions are continued transition to surface fire in the bay fuels, more likelihood of ignition from sleepers from the lightning night before last, and greater amounts of reburn. Look for rates of spread in needle-cast near 5-ch/hr with flame lengths of 2 feet. Expect higher numbers if scorched brush becomes involved. One other piece of good news is the continued drying will flush out the heat that we need to find.</p> <p>Structure: Okefenokee administrative site should not be impacted by fire spread during this operational period.</p> <p>IA: Expect active to very active fire behavior once fires become established.</p>

Rehab Specifications

Dozer Lines

General Description: Rehabilitation of suppression constructed “Dozer Lines” and “Berms” is necessary to avoid excessive soil erosion and restore natural landscape surface water flow.

Location (Suitable) Sites: See incident map for location of known dozer lines and berms. Berms with merchantable timber have been identified on incident maps. Additional lines should be rehabilitated as they are discovered in the field. All discoveries will be turned into situation unit and subsequently mapped.

Berm Definition: Berms with merchantable timber embedded within that is mixed with soil and smaller debris.

Merchantable Timber Definition: Minimum 2” top and 20 foot length.

Design/Construction Specifications

For areas with Merchantable Timber: Use excavator with thumb to remove the merchantable timber from the berm. Scatter the debris and soil into the fireline area. Lay out logs with the butt end towards the road. Leave the road open and in good shape. Merchantable timber will be removed at a later date. Ditches should be pulled and the road graded after the timber has been salvaged.

For areas with Non-merchantable Timber: Use heavy equipment to scatter debris and soil into the fireline area. Leave the road open and in good shape. Ditches should be pulled and the road graded after the timber has been salvaged.

INCIDENT EMERGENCY PLAN (IEP)

The goal of this Incident Emergency Plan (IEP) is to provide the guidelines necessary to Locate, Triage, Extricate, Treat and Transport accident Patients. The Division/Group Supervisor will initially oversee the emergency. Radio communication will be on the "Command Frequency". Names of injured or deceased individuals should not be given over the radio. Deceased individuals and their equipment are not to be moved, except to accomplish rescue work or to protect the health and safety of others. It is expected this organization will come from resources assigned within the Division or nearest adjoining forces.

DIVISION/GROUP SUPERVISOR

- Conduct Size-up of the Incident (Nature of Accident, Number/Type of Resources, Location)
- Coordinate "Line EMT" response to the accident (Utilize Closest EMT's).
- Begin "TRIAGE"
- Determine and initiate treatment and transportation needs
- Evaluate special needs (Law Enforcement, Heavy Rescue, Haz Mat)
- Coordinate with Air Attack for Air-Medical transportation needs
- Preserve the scene for accident investigation

MEDICAL GROUP SUPERVISOR (This position will be filled, only if needed)

- Supervise TRIAGE, Treatment and Transportation Unit Leaders.
- Place orders through Communications for ground ambulance, medical personnel, as needed
- Ensure proper security and traffic control.

TRIAGE UNIT LEADER (This position will be filled, only if needed)

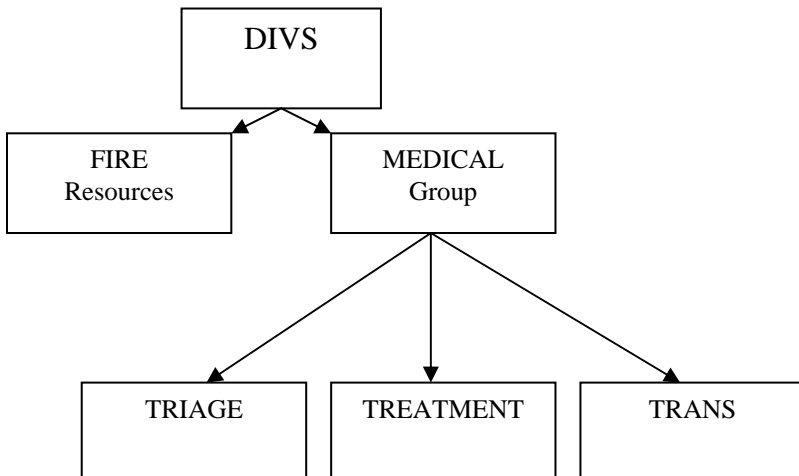
- Locate and TRIAGE all patients and relays information to Medical Group Supervisor.
- Ensure that Airway, Breathing and Circulation stabilization of patients is addressed during TRIAGE.
- Coordinate with Treatment Unit Leader for patient stabilization, extrication, and movement to treatment area.
- Utilize the "START" TRIAGE system.

TREATMENT UNIT LEADER (This position will be filled, only if needed)

- Establishes Immediate, Delayed and Minor treatment areas.
- Direct treatment and stabilization of Patients.
- Prioritize Patients for transport.
- Request medical personnel and supplies, as needed.
- Ensure continual TRIAGE of patients in treatment area.
- Coordinate with TRIAGE Unit leader for delivery of patients to the treatment area.
- Coordinate with the Transportation Unit Leader for delivery of patients to ambulances.
- Ensure documentation of patient conditions and treatments on TRIAGE tags.

TRANSPORTATION UNIT LEADER (This position will be filled, only if needed)

- Coordinate all patient transportation to medical facilities, air and ground.
- Establish communication with hospitals receiving patients.
- Coordinate with Treatment Unit Leader to determine number and category of patients.
- Designate ambulance/helicopter loading areas.
- Determine mode (air/ground) of patient transportation.
- Ensure patients information and destination is recorded.
