One hour fine dead fuel moisture is at 7% for Saturday. Moisture from rain has reduced the fire threat, HOWEVER some areas remain dry and burning continues. 1,000 hour fuels are drier than normal for this time of year. There is re-burn potential; mainly on the west side of the fire due to the amount of needle cast, fallen trees and scorched shrubs. Should wind become stronger than predicted, expect fire behavior to increase above predicted levels. In areas where fuels have been herbicided, expect quick ignitions, extreme heat, quicker rates-of-spread, and possible group tree torching potentially producing spotting problems.

NOTE- FIRE BEHAVIOR CALCULATIONS ARE FOR FIRES IN UNBURNED FUELS INCLUDING NEW IA STARTS.

All Divisions:

The fire continues a slow spread through the thick bays and muck soils. Roots and fallen trees are protecting heat sources allowing the fire to burn organic soils from the bottom up. Be heads-up for falling trees. 10% chance of rain.

Water continues to rise within the borders of the Okefenokee at its low point water was measured at 117' currently the level is 119' approximately .25' below the low of the 2007 Bugaboo fire. Things are improving but diligence is needed. Remember that most accidents occur on small fires or deceptively quiet areas of large fires.

Air Operations: Expect possible areas of heavy smoke especially on the east and north side of the fire.

SAFETY:

<u>WINDS</u> – Stay abreast of changing wx conditions throughout the entire shift. <u>THUNDERSTORMS</u> - these severe winds can create extreme fire behavior, with winds gusting over 30 mph. <u>Live Trees/SNAGS</u> – are falling in all <u>Divisions</u> – will be influenced by Thunderstorm outflow winds. FUELS: Watch for pockets of cured shrubs or blankets of red needles beginning to cover the forest floor re-burn is still possible. 1,000 and 10,000 hour fuels as well as deep duff pockets are providing the heat source. Stay focused, and put LCES in place before starting operations. *Energy Release Component (ERC) is running near average for this time of year.*
