5. General Control Objectives For The Incident (Include Alternatives)			
<p>Provide for the safety of the public and local communities by working closely with local Fire, Emergency Mgt and Law Enforcement agencies. Keep these agencies and the public informed of current and expected condition as well as any impending evacuations.</p> <p>Upon request of the local unit, provide support and/or resources for any new starts.</p> <p>Promptly suppress any reburns near homes or structures. Suppress reburns near roadways and logging operations. Mop up perimeter to a distance that ensures the fire can not cross control lines. suppress any reburn within 100 ft of the perimeter.</p> <p>Provide and document training opportunities as appropriate within cost constraints. Consider trainees for any and all unfilled positions or replacements.</p> <p>As the weather allows and fire behavior moderates prepare to transfer command back to local jurisdictions by out planning for resources needs, completing all reporting requirements, after action reviews and closing out financial records. File all records as per standards and complete documentation package and boxes.</p> <p>Cost containment is an important aspect of any incident managed by this team. Resources will be released once they are excess to the incident regardless of time remaining. Track and report costs daily, ensure costs are commensurate with fire complexity.</p>

<p>One concept of Risk management is: "Transfer of Risk"</p> <p>Each of us, especially those of us in supervisory or leadership roles make decisions that transfer risk to others. When we decide to assign a crew or engine or squad to a certain task we have now transferred the risk that goes along with that assignment. As leaders it is important that we mindfully acknowledge this. When I ask someone to cut a tree, I'm no longer at risk, however I need to understand that what I've asked has risks associated with it and I need to be sure that the risk is worth taking. Likewise the individual assigned that task has a responsibility to either accept or decline that risk. Have a risk based discussion before starting any task, think the situation thru from start to finish.....BE SURE THE RISK IS WORTH THE EFFORT!</p>

WEATHER DISCUSSION: A cold front will approach the area from the north today, then stall nearby through this weekend. Low pressure could develop off the southeast coast early next week. Increased moisture into early next week will result in better chances of showers and thunderstorms.

FORECAST FOR TODAY:

WEATHER: Partly cloudy, becoming mostly cloudy with scattered showers and thunderstorms in the afternoon. Chance of rain 50%.

MAX TEMPERATURES: 93 to 95 (24 hour trend ~ 2 degrees cooler). Heat Index around 106.

MIN HUMIDITY: 50% to 55% (24 hour trend ~ 5-10% higher)

20 FT WINDS: West 3 to 6 mph, becoming southwest 6 to 9 mph with gusts to 14 mph in the afternoon, then becoming south-southeast following the passage of the seabreeze.

SEABREEZE PASSAGE: Sweat Farm ~ 2000-2100, Race Pond ~ 1800-1900

STABILITY/INVERSION: Inversion lifting ~ 9 AM. Mixing heights around **6500'**. Transport winds southwest 8 mph. Dispersion Index 30.

FRIDAY: Mostly cloudy. Numerous showers and thunderstorms in the afternoon. Chance of rain 60%. Lows in the mid 70s. Highs around 90. Minimum humidity 58 to 62%. East winds 3 to 6 mph, increasing to 6 to 9 mph with gusts to 14 mph in the afternoon.

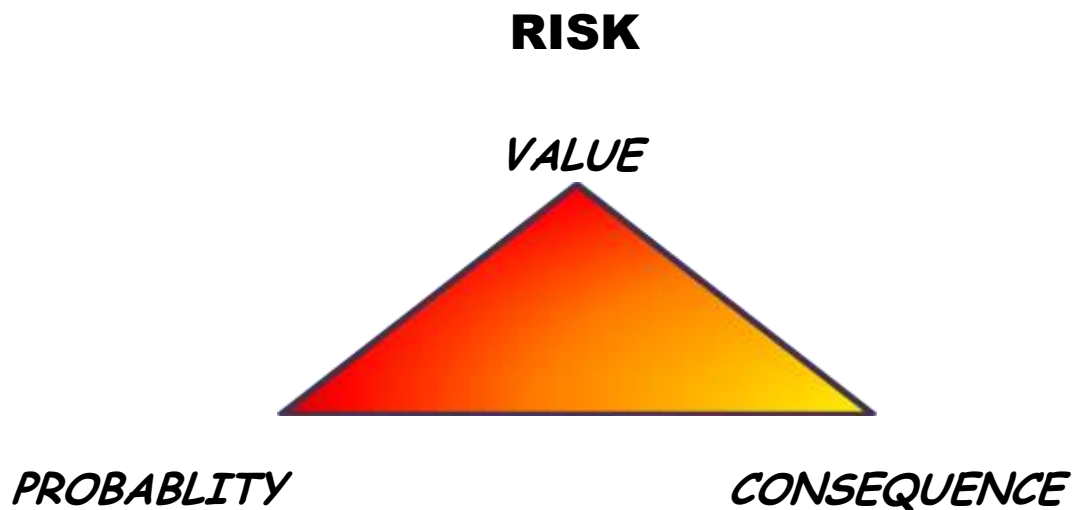

Operational personnel are taking the time to identify the tasks and challenges for a potential burn out. Do you allow yourself the "decision space" to make an appropriate decision? Do you find yourself, rushed or worse, regretting not doing adequate research or taking the time before you signed on the dotted line? Take a few moments today before you make your next decision.
- Are you and your crew complacent? Do you "forget" to wear your seat belt? Perhaps fail to wear all your PPE just because the fire activity has moderated some? Have you checked the condition (or presence) of the hand tools on your unit lately? Being recognized as a professional firefighter means you will not accept complacency from yourself or others around you.

Protocol for IA support of the Honey Prairie Fire

In the event the Honey Prairie Fire has a breach of the swamp's edge break the coordination of local fire resources and incident resources is a top priority for the safety of all personnel involved.

GFC tractor plow resources and line supervisors have the following channels and frequencies available that are on the ICS -205.

The SE Compact channel WILL ONLY be used for Air to Ground. DO NOT USE IT ON ANY Satilla DISTRICT wildfires other than air to ground for Honey Prairie assigned aircraft.

Below is a checklist that is to be used for coordination of the air and ground resources on Honey Prairie Fire IA support.

1. Once GFC tractor plow resources arrive on scene the GFC STPL will coordinate with the appropriate DIVS. A lead tractor will be identified and known to all personnel before the fire is engaged.
2. If needed for an extended attack situation the Satilla District aircraft (*Smokey 3, Smokey 7 or Smokey 22*) will be dispatched to the scene to assist in the coordination of the tractor plow resources.
3. The Satilla District aircraft will coordinate with other Honey Prairie Incident aircraft on the Victor frequency of 122.575 or 122.375.
4. The Satilla District aircraft will communicate to the tractor plow resources on GFC Mobile (159.390) The lead tractor will be the point of contact for the aircraft.
5. The Honey Prairie Incident aircraft will communicate to GFC tractor plow resources on SE Compact (159.285) (*this will include rotor aircraft*) *This channel is ONLY to be used for the coordination of air to ground*
