Maintain and improve relationships with state, parish, municipal, and other cooperators. 5. Minimize fire impacts to structures and infrastructure to reduce the potential for adverse health, social, financial, and economic hardships.				
4. Operational Period Command Emphasis: Stop, Think, Discuss, then Act and ensure LCES is in place prior to engaging the fires. Ensure that: (1) all starts receive a strategic, risk-based response commensurate with threats and opportunities and that; (2) personnel consider fire and fuel conditions, weather, values at risk, and resources available when taking management actions.				
General Situational Awareness Local fuel thresholds: 20-foot wind speed >20 mph RH <30% Temperature >95 degrees Fahrenheit KBDI >650 Historically, large fires (>80 acres) on the KNF tend to increase when BI values are >19 and 100-hour fuels <17%, especially in combination with other local thresholds listed above. KBDI is a good indicator of resistance to control. At KBDI values >400, the litter and duff layers contribute to fire intensity and will burn actively. Be prepared to adjust tactics based on current and expected fire behavior.

Min RH values will remain lower on Monday for most of the area. The only exception will be for portions of far northeast Texas, southeast Oklahoma and southwest Arkansas where they will range from around 40 to 55 percent. WEATHER/CLIMATOLOGY DISCUSSION:

Check the daily fire weather forecast for the NWS zone that you are working in.
Request a Spot Weather Forecast for sight specific weather before taking action on a wildfire.

Outlook as of 1600 on 10/08/2023

Dry weather will continue into the first half of the new week, with gradually warming conditions. Winds will be lighter over the next few days, RHs will still fall into the 20 to 30 percent range on Monday, especially across central Louisiana and the south half of Mississippi. This combined with ongoing drought conditions will result in continued elevated fire danger. Moisture air will start returning on Tuesday increasing the RH and upping the chance of rain on Wednesday. No notable fog development is anticipated over the next few days.

FIRE BEHAVIOR DISCUSSION:

A fuels and fire behavior advisory has been issued for Louisiana and Mississippi due to extended drought.

The majority of Mississippi is above 700 KBDI with the highest at the Bude RAWS in SW MS at 792. Louisiana has several RAWS above 700 KBDI also. The fuels conditions are so dry that it will take significant rainfall to bring fuel moistures back to normal for this time of year. With the live and dead fuel moisture at critically low levels, high resistance to control should be expected on all fires even if little to no wind is forecasted.

GS3-Grass/Shrub: *ROS 14 to 33 **CPH, FL 6-8 feet. Expect FL in excess of 8 feet and ROS exceeding 33 CPH in areas dominated by denser grass fuels.

7-Southern Rough: ROS 13 to 30 CPH, FL 4-6 feet. Expect fire to move into the crown immediately if overstory is present. If the fire becomes established in the crowns ROS and FL could exceed calculations.

TU2-Timber: ROS 5 to 12 CPH, FL 3-4 feet. Although this is a litter fuel, expect fire to move into the crown immediately if overstory is present. ROS and FL could exceed calculations if crown fire gets established.

Spotting up to ¼ of a mile away has routinely been reported on recent fires, including small initial attack fires.
***PIG is predicted to be 75% on Monday and Tuesday - EXPECT HIGH PROBABILITY OF SPOT FIRES

*ROS-Rate of Spread, **CPH-Chains per Hour (1 chain = 66 feet) 40 chains per hour is .5 miles, ***PIG-Probability of Ignition

In the event conditions change, forecasts may need to be revised. Major changes may include,

- 1) Major change in weather forecast
- 2) Widespread rains
- 3) Observed fire behavior is not well represented by forecast

SAFETY

Fuels are dry across the region, both dead and live. Fire behavior will remain dangerous with or without the wind in these extremely dry conditions, always expect torching in the timber or brush fuel models. **Reburn of scorched needle cast in pine will continue to be a holding problem** on containment lines.

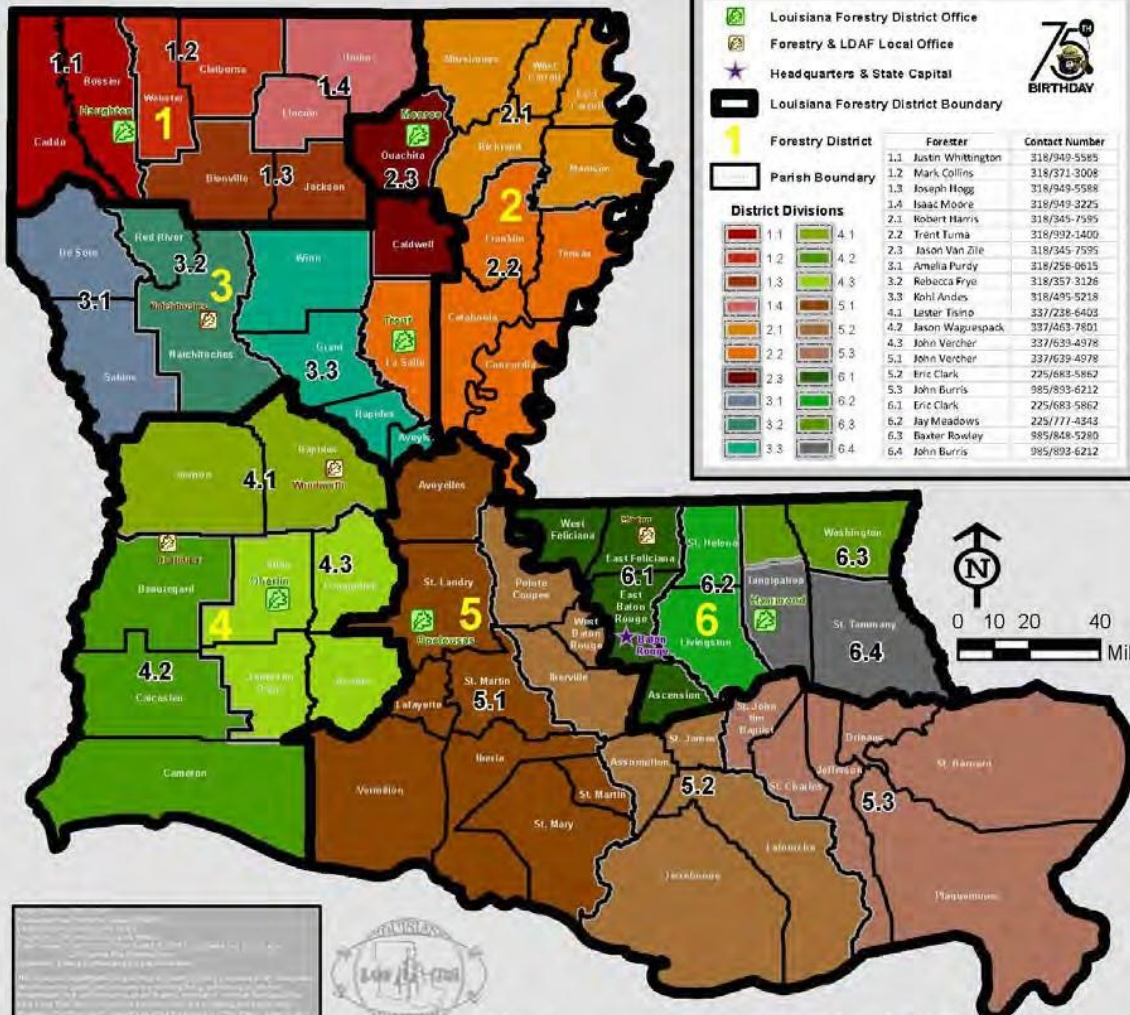

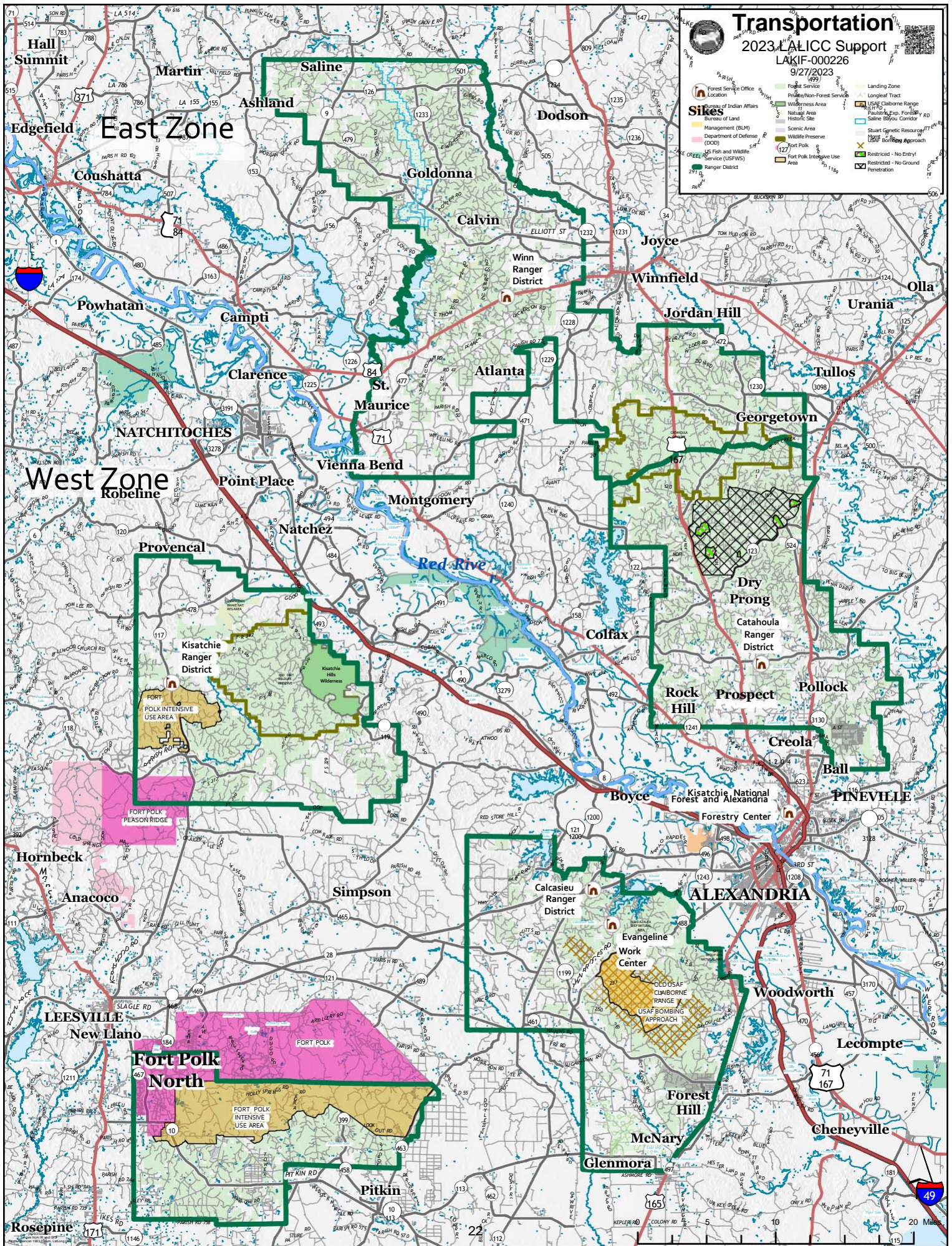

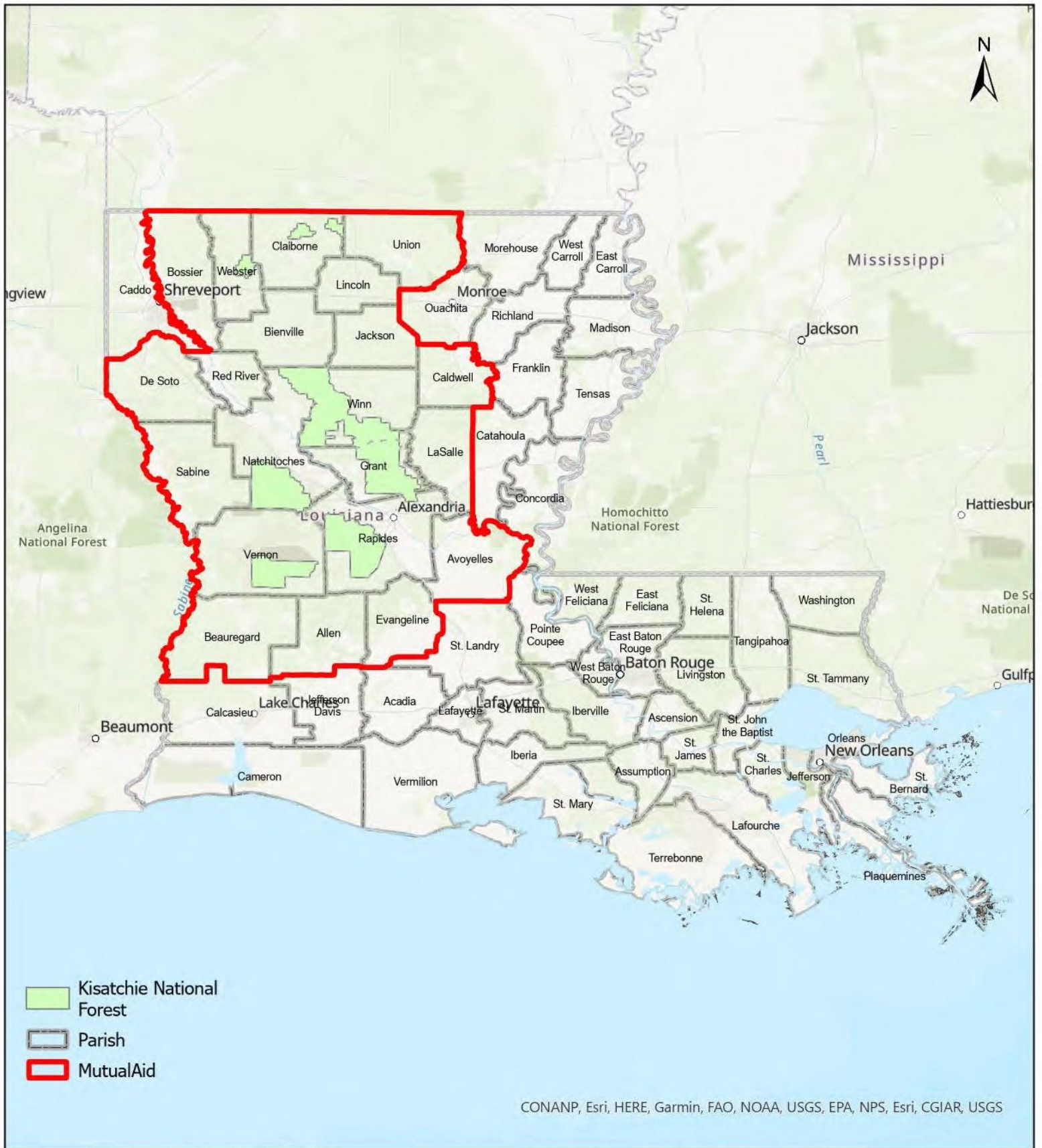

Medical Emergencies

IWI IC Responsibilities – Division Group Supervisor or Point of Contact

- Take charge of the scene – inform the Division Supervisor and LICC that you are the IWI IC and establish radio communications (frequencies, channels). Identify the emergency name – Division A medical, etc.
- Assign or begin patient assessment (Medical Incident Report - MIR) and first aid. Request additional medical resources on division/branch or across incident. Transmit MIR patient information to Communications.
- Determine patient transportation through consultation with communications and 911 when needed. Consider transportation time, risk to personnel, destination facility and available operational resources. If air transport is chosen, implement the plan for alternative transportation in the event aircraft cannot complete the mission. Order transportation resources through Communications as early as possible.
- Notify Communications as resources arrive and any patient status changes. Names of injured or deceased individuals will not be transmitted on the radio.
- Initiate documentation for future investigation; if a line safety officer is available, assign them to lead documentation. Do not move deceased individuals, gear or personal effects except to accomplish rescue work or protect the safety of others. Obtain written documentation of witnesses. Unit Log, ICS 214, may be used for initial documentation, but a narrative will be required.
- As appropriate, conduct an After-Action Review to determine successes, areas to improve and lessons learned.

Medical Incident Report

FOR A NON-EMERGENCY INCIDENT, WORK THROUGH CHAIN OF COMMAND TO REPORT AND TRANSPORT INJURED PERSONNEL AS NECESSARY.

FOR A MEDICAL EMERGENCY: IDENTIFY ON SCENE INCIDENT COMMANDER BY NAME AND POSITION AND ANNOUNCE "MEDICAL EMERGENCY" TO INITIATE RESPONSE FROM IMT COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH.

Use the following items to communicate situation to communications/dispatch.

1. CONTACT COMMUNICATIONS / DISPATCH (Verify correct frequency prior to starting report)

Ex: "Communications, Div. Alpha. Stand-by for Emergency Traffic."

2. INCIDENT STATUS: Provide incident summary (including number of patients) and command structure.

Ex: "Communications, I have a Red priority patient, unconscious, struck by a falling tree. Requesting air ambulance to Forest Road 1 at (Lat./Long.) This will be the Trout Meadow Medical, IC is TFLD Jones. EMT Smith is providing medical care."
