Management Objectives

- Capture damage to roads, infrastructure, and other points of concern in Field Maps. Include photos and detailed descriptions as needed.
- Support the needs of employees impacted by Hurricane Helene.

Major Hazards & Risks: Change and Transition

Today there is going to be a lot of change and transition within the incident. This is a common watch out, and we should all be well versed in how to manage it. I wanted to touch on a couple things to bring to the front of your minds,

- If you are staying on the incident, make sure you know who you work for, and have communication with them before heading into the field.
- If you are leaving the incident, are you prepared for the travel home? Did you get adequate rest to travel, especially if you are going to be driving a lot?
- As our minds shift from the incident back to home life, it is very important to make sure we stay focused until we make it all the way home safe and sound.

RESPECT

Know your subordinates and look out for their well-being.

- Put the safety of your subordinates above all other objectives.
- Take care of your subordinates' needs.
- Resolve conflicts between individuals on the team.

Keep your subordinates informed.

- Provide accurate and timely briefings.
- Give the reason (intent) for assignments and tasks.
- Make yourself available to answer questions at appropriate times.

Build the team.

- Conduct frequent debriefings with the team to identify lessons learned.
- Recognize individual and team accomplishments and reward them appropriately.
- Apply disciplinary measures equally.

Employ your subordinates in accordance with their capabilities.

- Observe human behavior as well as fire behavior.
- Provide early warning to subordinates of tasks they will be responsible for.
- Consider team experience, fatigue, and physical limitations when accepting assignments.

Human Factor Watch Outs

Watching out for yourself, coworkers, subordinates and your boss is a primary responsibility for everyone involved in high risk activities. Watch outs are not just for the tactical environment. The Human Factor Watch Outs are designed to create an opportunity for you to take a tactical pause and re-evaluate your situation. If any of the following occur:

- Your briefing was unclear.
- You are not getting answers to your questions.
- You are not getting clear acknowledgement of your message.
- You are encountering hazards that are not mentioned in your brief.
- Your team is not debriefing.
- Your tempo is too high to maintain command and control.

CLAIMS - To file a claim for Property Lost and/or Damaged, contact Susan Deimel, COMP for an OF-289. A fillable/digital OF-289 and instruction sheet are located on the LinkTree using the above QR code. If you are unable to complete and sign the form electronically, paper copies of the form and instruction sheet can be picked up in the Finance Section. Information that should be provided as a part of a claim includes pictures, identifying information such as serial numbers, vin, model, etc., age of the equipment, cost information for replacement including applicable shipping or labor costs. Also, attach general messages or handwritten notes that support the claim.

Repair or replacement of tires and chainsaws must be handled through the OF-289 process. For tires, be sure to include a picture of the numbers on the sidewall. Any property loss or damage claim submitted must be attributable to work on the incident not normal wear and tear or normal road hazards.

COMPENSATION FOR INJURY - Excluding injuries or illnesses that occur within the IWI process, all personnel needing medical care for any reason must contact the MEDL before going to a hospital or clinic. The MEDL will coordinate with the COMP if a CA-16 is needed.

OVERTIME & PAYCHECK

As these are not fire suppression activities, the overtime provisions of P.L. 106-558 (Wildland Fire Overtime) do not apply.

Consequently, when entering overtime hours using TC21, DO NOT USE Prefix 11. This applies regardless of fund code on your Resource Order, funding used.

We want to stress this to all, as we don't want individuals getting a bill for collection!!!

Two key points to cover:

1. Regardless of whether the incident you are on is funded by FEMA (F code) or by internal agency funds (represented by unique P-codes recently set up for Hurricane Helene forest program response, or any fund code), the nature of the work being performed is not wildland fire suppression. Exempt employees are not entitled to code overtime hours using prefix 11. Exempt employees who are paid at the GS-10 step 1 rate or above will have a "capped" hourly rate at 1.5 times the GS-10 step 1 rate or their regular hourly rate, whichever is more. There is no provision in law to allow a waiver. Hourly rates for GS employees can be reviewed [here](#). Wage Grade (WG) employees are non-exempt and do not have capped overtime rates.
2. The biweekly earning limitation on premium pay is not automatically waived for either FEMA or for internal agency response. The Forest Service has not yet been granted a waiver. When requested, there is no guarantee that it will be approved. Until an approved waiver is in place for USFS, exempt employees are also subject to the biweekly pay cap and are not authorized to change the RSEL status in Paycheck 8 to avoid the biweekly cap. If a waiver is granted after timesheets are submitted, corrections can be completed to claim the difference if the waiver is retroactive. Because WG employees are non-exempt, they are not subject to the biweekly cap.

Medical Incident Report

FOR A NON-EMERGENCY INCIDENT, WORK THROUGH CHAIN OF COMMAND TO REPORT AND TRANSPORT INJURED PERSONNEL AS NECESSARY.

FOR A MEDICAL EMERGENCY: IDENTIFY ON SCENE INCIDENT COMMANDER BY NAME AND POSITION AND ANNOUNCE "MEDICAL EMERGENCY" TO INITIATE RESPONSE FROM IMT COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH.

Use the following items to communicate situation to communications/dispatch.

1. CONTACT COMMUNICATIONS / DISPATCH (Verify correct frequency prior to starting report)

Ex: "Communications, Div. Alpha. Stand-by for Emergency Traffic."

2. INCIDENT STATUS: Provide incident summary (including number of patients) and command structure.

Ex: "Communications, I have a Red priority patient, unconscious, struck by a falling tree. Requesting air ambulance to Forest Road 1 at (Lat./Long.) This will be the Trout Meadow Medical, IC is TFLD Jones. EMT Smith is providing medical care."
