**Driving Off of a Designated Open Road:** Only the routes that are displayed on the current MVUM are open to public motor vehicle use (36 CFR 261.13). Travel off of designated roads on National Forest System lands is prohibited. This prohibition applies regardless of the presence or absence of signs displaying designations for motor vehicle use . Many routes are signed with a numbered route marker, but only the routes displayed on the current MVUM are "open" for motor vehicle use. Resource Damage: It is prohibited to operate a motor vehicle on National

Forest System lands in a manner that damages or unreasonably disturbs the land, wildlife, or resources (CFR 36 261.12 (h)). It is illegal to collect, damage, or displace items of arc heological or historical nature. In Arizona, OHVs must be titled and licensed. The Arizona Department of Transportation-Motor Vehicle Di vision (MVD) is the agency that issues certificates of title, registration, license plates, and OHV decals. Out-of-state residents may use an out-of-state OHV for up to 30 days while in Arizona if the vehicle displays a current decal or registration from the person's home OHV Decal: The annual purchase of an Arizona OHV decal

is required to operate OHVs on public and state lands. **Street Legal OHVs**: Arizona state law permits OHVs to be driven legally on public roads and highways when they meet registration, license, and equipment requirements. Street legal OHVs must display Arizona

Motorized game retrieval is not permitted in travel restricted areas, Operating a motor vehicle involves inherent risk and natural hazards and may not cross riparian areas, streams or wetland areas except at hardened crossings or crossings with existing culverts. Motorized game retrieval is not permitted more than one mile from an open road or when conditions are such that travel would increase the likelihood of negative resource impacts (i.e. muddy, wet soils with potential for compaction and rutting).

 Minimize campfire impacts: do not burn trash, useexisting campfire rings or fire pans.

 Keep pets leashed and under control at all times. Store food in your vehicle or a bear-proof container. • Be considerate of other visitors. Many people camp on National Forest System lands to enjoy the peace and quiet.

Campfires are generally permitted, EXCEPT:
