Minimize fire impacts to values at risk including SRP powerline, Hwy 88 corridor, Canyon Lake Marina, Tortilla Flat, and Pleasant Valley, Tonto Basin, ZT Ranch, Flying W Ranch, Spring Creek Ranch and Dell Shay Cabin. 3. Reduce the risks to public safety personnel from the potential exposure of COVID-19 through coordination with the State of Arizona and Pinal County emergency response cooperators, and departments of health services. 4. Maintain and develop partnerships with stakeholders, cooperators, community leaders, and local agencies through timely and accurate information. 5. ...FLASH FLOOD WATCH IS EFFECT THROUGH TODAY...

Weather Discussion: The atmosphere remains rich in moisture and favorable for showers and storms to form, some that may result in flash flooding. Chance of rain increases from south to north, through Sunday evening rainfall amounts on the Superstition Fire could be near ½" and ¼" on the Hidden Fire, although local higher amounts are possible. Increased clouds and rain in the area will result in cooler temperatures and higher RHs. Initial indications are that there will still be the possibility of wetting rain into Tuesday, thereafter temperatures increase with drier conditions.

INPUTS

WEATHER SUMMARY: Moderately widespread moisture moves into the area for 24-28 hours resulting in scattered storms. Moderated temperatures and higher humidity values along with primarily westerly winds. Chances of downbursts in the vicinity of storms over the fire areas could bring strong gusty winds and lightning.

OUTPUTS

FIRE BEHAVIOR

GENERAL:

Summary – Expect fire activity to be reduced again from yesterday’s fire behavior. Fire in grass dominant areas will likely struggle to sustain any significant growth throughout the burn period due to cloud cover, increased humidity, and the possibility of wetting rain. Timber and brush fuels are also unlikely to allow for much growth, but the heavier fuels will be able to smolder and retain heat for continued ignition when conditions are more favorable over the following days.

SPECIFIC:

Hidden Fire – Overall, fire behavior will be less active than yesterday. Expect continued creeping and low rates of spread through heavier fuels with minimal additional growth. Occasional flareups may occur in brush or pinyon/juniper, but these rare instances of active fire behavior are unlikely to contribute to any sustained fire growth.

DIV K - Fire will continue creeping along the northwest perimeter within Skunk Tank Canyon but is unlikely to progress up the southern aspect to the north.

DIV F - The western perimeter will exhibit minimal growth downslope along Rock House Spring in the shrub fuels.

DIV A - Southerly growth in the pine stringers will continue towards Juniper Mountain and fill in along the 416 road.

DIV Z - Minimal growth where the Hidden Fire slopped across the 416 into the 2018 Bears Fire footprint. Little growth in pine within the fire scar, essentially no growth in the brush.

DIV Q – Fire is more likely to burn around the base of Chalk Mountain than go up and over it, but less than 0.10 mile of growth is anticipated.

Superstition Fire – Fire is continuing to burn in the Sonoran grasses in the mid-to-lower elevations north of Superstition Mountain. Activity is expected to be smoldering and creeping due to the environmental conditions. Remaining heat and potential growth are limited to the area southwest of Battleship Mountain on the unnamed knife ridge between Second Water Canyon and West Boulder Canyon. If the area receives more than 0.25” of rain, most heat sources will likely be extinguished.

AIR OPERATIONS:

Hazy conditions early in the morning. Light gusts in the afternoon and the potential for cells building throughout the area could indicate the potential for downdrafts and outflow winds.

SAFETY – Complacency and Mental Framing

We all have mental slides we use as shortcuts. We are on a fire...in the southwest...on the Tonto NF...with ERCs around the 95th percentile...rain is in the forecast. This is a slide many of us are quite familiar with. But...it is not late June or early July and monsoons are not setting up. This current weather pattern is a very brief respite from the hot and dry conditions that have allowed the multitude of fires in the southwest to grow the last few weeks. We will be returning to those conditions which favor the potential for extreme fire behavior in the next few days. Ensure you are mentally prepared for when fire behavior ramps back up in a few days.

Heat Related Fatigue

Heat becomes a problem when *humidity, air temperature, and radiant heat* combine with *hard work* to raise body temperature beyond safe limits. Sweat is your main defense. Everyone on the fire line must understand the importance of drinking water *often*.

THREE MOST COMMON FORMS OF HYPERTHERMIA (Heat Disorders):

-Heat cramps

-Heat exhaustion

-Heat stroke

Hikes into a fire typically raise your body temperature *1-2 degrees* from your pre-hike level.

Maintain low skin temperature when possible (*shade*), as it allows heat transfer from the body.

Find opportunities to cycle and rest your resources as necessary, vehicle A/C is an option if possible.

Work expectations *above physical fitness levels* can increase risk of Heat Related Illness.

Key Points

-Hydration alone will not prevent a heat-related injury.

You need to combine hydration with good fitness and adequate recovery from physical tasks

-Your initial hike sets your body's core temp for the day

-Your PPE weight (pack and tool) contributes to high physical demands and higher body temperatures

-Performing physical tasks –such as hiking up hills- can increase your body temperature to near-critical levels

-Physical work is our biggest producer of body heat.

Breaks and appropriate levels of physical exertion are important in mitigating adverse heat related issues

FOR A NON-EMERGENCY INCIDENT, WORK THROUGH CHAIN OF COMMAND TO REPORT AND TRANSPORT INJURED PERSONNEL AS NECESSARY.

FOR A MEDICAL EMERGENCY: IDENTIFY ON SCENE INCIDENT COMMANDER BY NAME AND POSITION AND ANNOUNCE "MEDICAL EMERGENCY" TO INITIATE RESPONSE FROM IMT COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH.

Use the following items to communicate situation to communications/dispatch.

1. CONTACT COMMUNICATIONS / DISPATCH (**Verify correct frequency prior to starting report**)

Ex: "Communications, Div. Alpha. Stand-by for Emergency Traffic."

2. INCIDENT STATUS: *Provide incident summary (including number of patients) and command structure.*

Ex: "Communications, I have a Red priority patient, unconscious, struck by a falling tree. Requesting air ambulance to Forest Road 1 at (Lat./Long.) This will be the Trout Meadow Medical, IC is TFLD Jones. EMT Smith is providing medical care."
