

Ensure transparent, timely and accurate communication at all levels of the incident and strengthen relationships with cooperators and landowners. All incident assigned personnel should be prepared to take appropriate actions regarding:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Professional behavior, conduct, and timely/effective communication. • Personal safety and the safety of others, including driving slowly and defensively. • Manage fatigue by taking breaks and maintaining work/rest cycles. • Minimize risk and limit exposure to infectious disease through coordination and alignment with the state of New Mexico and local County Health Departments. <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Incident Objectives</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Provide for firefighter and public safety through hazard recognition and application of the risk management process. • Coordinate with agency administrators, Incident Management Teams assigned to the fire, and Strategic Operational Planning. • Provide timely and continuous information to affected agency partners, cooperators, and the public. • Coordinate suppression activities with assigned incident Resource Advisors, State of New Mexico Representatives and Tribal Advisors to minimize impacts to wilderness, natural and cultural resources. • Protect at-risk values to avoid loss or damage of communities, private inholdings, infrastructure, range asses, wildlife, and watersheds. <p style="text-align: center;"><u>Operational Objectives</u></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Identify Values at Risk on state, federal and private properties, including homes, businesses, utility infrastructure, watersheds and cultural resources when developing Management Action Points (MAPs) and perimeter control lines. • Develop a strategy that minimizes fire impacts to residences, commercial properties, critical community infrastructure to reduce the potential for adverse health, social, financial, and economic hardships, and incident containment. • Coordinate and share incident assigned resources. • Shadow and coordinate with adjoining Incident Management Teams to develop a suppression strategy on the east side of the fire.

Major Hazards and Risks:

- **Communications:** Know where weak spots are
- **Driving:** Slow and Cautious with Lights On. Follow Agency SOP's
- **Health Mitigations:** CDC Guidelines FMB MPHAT
- **Medical Emergencies (IWI)** Identify resources on North Zone

- **Driving:** Civilian traffic on highways tend to travel at high speeds. Continue to slow down, drive cautiously, drive defensively. Drive below the speed limit (15 mph) through camp and Philmont property. Be mindful of pedestrians and wildlife on the roads.
- **Wildlife Awareness:** Known wildlife in area are Antelope, Elk, Deer, Buffalo, Racoons, Bears, and Rattle Snakes and an occasional Mountain Lion. Do not feed the wildlife. If you have a wildlife encounter notify your supervisor and communicate possible risk.
- **Slips, Trips, and Falls:** Take your time while traveling on foot. It is quite easy to step in the wrong place or the wrong way. Take extra precautions if you walk off the established walkways, trails. Stay alert, be aware of your location.

- **Taking your time:** No need to rush tasks, always come up with contingency plans

Steps to Follow
Place an N95 mask on individual and escort to an isolated area for further assessment.
Documentation to be initiated by medical personnel
Obtain pertinent information from symptomatic individual (supervisor, home unit, etc.)
Have the individual treated and transported as necessary.
Protect and secure all personal data collected (personal health information).
