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**WEATHER DISCUSSION:** Unsettled weather will continue today with numerous showers and thunderstorms expected during the afternoon and evening. Storms will move off mountains into the lower elevations in the late afternoon hours, dissipating during the evening. Otherwise, it will be partly cloudy in the morning and mostly cloudy in the afternoon and evening with near normal temperatures. The overall weather pattern will not change through early next week with daily showers and thunderstorms and near or slightly below normal temperatures.

**WEATHER FORECAST TODAY (Saturday):**

Partly cloudy in the morning, becoming mostly cloudy in the afternoon. A 70 percent chance of showers and thunderstorms is the afternoon.

**MAX TEMPERATURES:** 81-86

**MINIMUM HUMIDITY:** 26-36%

**20 FT WINDS:** Terrain driven early, becoming south 5 to 10 mph

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**OUTLOOK FOR TONIGHT (Saturday Night):**

**Today’s General Fire Behavior:**  
 Smoldering start to the day with activity limited to dead and down and duff layers. By late morning, fire will start responding to the clear skies with minimal creeping and smoldering. With the increased fine fuel moisture expect minimal if any fire spread. The dead and down will continue smoldering and may spread from log to log. The live brush fuel moistures are high enough to inhibit fire spread in the brush fields.

***\*Heads up for expected lightning and outflow winds in the fire area\****

**Buckhorn Fire:**

**DIV Q:** Don’t anticipate any fire movement along the 2034 rd. or along the southern river corridor. If it dries out enough today the northern head along the river may show some slow creeping with minimal fire spread. This area will continue to have smoldering in the dead and down fuels.

**DIV S:** Fire activity along the 2030 rd. should be minimal if any, mainly dead and down smoldering. The northern portion of the fire may show some slow creeping with minimal fire spread ... if it dries out enough. In the following days if the fine fuels dry out watch for the northeast portion of the head, it is lined up for a slope reversal back toward the lookout spot on the ridgeline. The brush field north of the 2034 rd. has a high enough live fuel moisture that it is unlikely to spread.

**Initial Attack:** Daily lightning cloud-to-ground strikes are increasing in number throughout the area. Surface fuels remain dry and available to ignite in the absence of widespread rainfall. Holdovers are somewhat unlikely due to lack of deep duff, concentrations of dead/downed fuels, or closed canopy sheltering fuels but initial attack potential is increasing due to the increased number of afternoon thunderstorms.

### Air Ops/Smoke Dispersion

No inversion or residual smoke to limit operations, but cloud cover and forming storms may limit operations in the afternoon. Watch for outflow winds in the afternoon.

### Safety

Remember the 30:30 rule – If you can see lightning and hear the thunderclap within 30 seconds, that means the lightning strike was within 6 miles (5 seconds per mile for sound). Consider taking cover for 30 minutes and repeat as necessary if lightning continues. If precipitation occurs driving will be hazardous on the wet and muddy roads.

- Discuss the risks that are relevant to your operational assignment and the probability of success.
- Discuss your medical plan so that you are prepared to manage an injury.
- Today is the day for transition from the SWCIMT2 to the CWZ Type 3 Team. Know and understand your assignment and who you are working for.

### **For all your firefighting and operational tasks, perform a five step risk assessment by:**

- **Establishing situation awareness by identifying hazards.**
- **Assessing hazard potential.**
- **Developing hazard controls and making risk management decisions.**
- **Implementing hazard controls.**
- **Supervising implementation and evaluating effectiveness.**

1. CONTACT COMMUNICATIONS / DISPATCH (**Verify correct frequency prior to starting report**)

2. INCIDENT STATUS: *Provide incident summary (including number of patients) and command structure.*

*Ex: "Communications, I have a Red priority patient, unconscious, struck by a falling tree. Requesting air ambulance to Forest Road 1 at (Lat./Long.) This will be the Trout Meadow Medical, IC is TFLD Jones. EMT Smith is providing medical care."*
