All operational strategies and tactics should consider associated risk to firefighter/public safety and utilize the options that have the highest probability for success combined with the lowest amount of exposure. 2) Protect values at risk, including private homes, infrastructure, and critical wildlife/grazing lands, and important watersheds. 3) Utilize public information officers to communicate clearly and timely with elected officials, stakeholders, local communities, and members of the public on current fire situation.													
Control Objectives: • Ensure LCES is in place prior to engagement. • Utilize aircraft to prevent fire spread and secure the line. • Construct line using natural barriers whenever possible. • Look for indirect firing opportunities. • Conduct burnout operations if conditions allow.

Spot Forecast for Rocky Canyon...NUIFC

Forecast is based on forecast start time of 0600 MDT on August 10. If conditions become unrepresentative...contact the National Weather Service.

.DISCUSSION...The main change from the prior forecast is a round of showers and isolated thunderstorms moving over the fire between 2000-2400 tonight. Gusty and erratic outflow winds up to 30-40 mph are possible as these showers move through.

On Monday, isolated to scattered showers and thunderstorms are expected to develop after 1400 or so, and will be capable of producing gusty outflow winds up to 45 mph. As moisture continues to increase across the area, expect daily afternoon thunderstorms that will become increasingly wetter alongside increasing humidity through at least Wednesday and likely the whole week.

.MONDAY...

Sky/weather.....Mostly sunny (25-35 percent cloud cover). Chance of showers and thunderstorms after 1400.

Chance of pcpn.....20 percent.

Chance of lightning.15 percent.

Max temperature.....82-85.

Min humidity.....21-24 percent.

Wind (20 ft).....Southeast winds 3 to 6 mph becoming west 6 to 10 mph after 1100. Gusty and erratic winds expected near thunderstorms.

Mixing height.....11700 ft AGL (80-90th Percentile).

Transport winds.....West 10 to 15 mph.

.MONDAY NIGHT...

Sky/weather.....Mostly cloudy (65-75 percent cloud cover) then becoming partly cloudy (40-50 percent cloud cover). Slight chance of showers before 2200.

Chance of pcpn.....15 percent before 2200.

Chance of lightning.10 percent before 2200.

Max humidity.....45-48 percent.

Wind (20 ft).....West winds 6 to 10 mph becoming southeast 3 to 6 mph after 2200. Gusty and erratic winds expected near showers in the evening.

Transport winds.....West around 13 mph becoming south around 7 mph overnight.

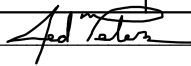

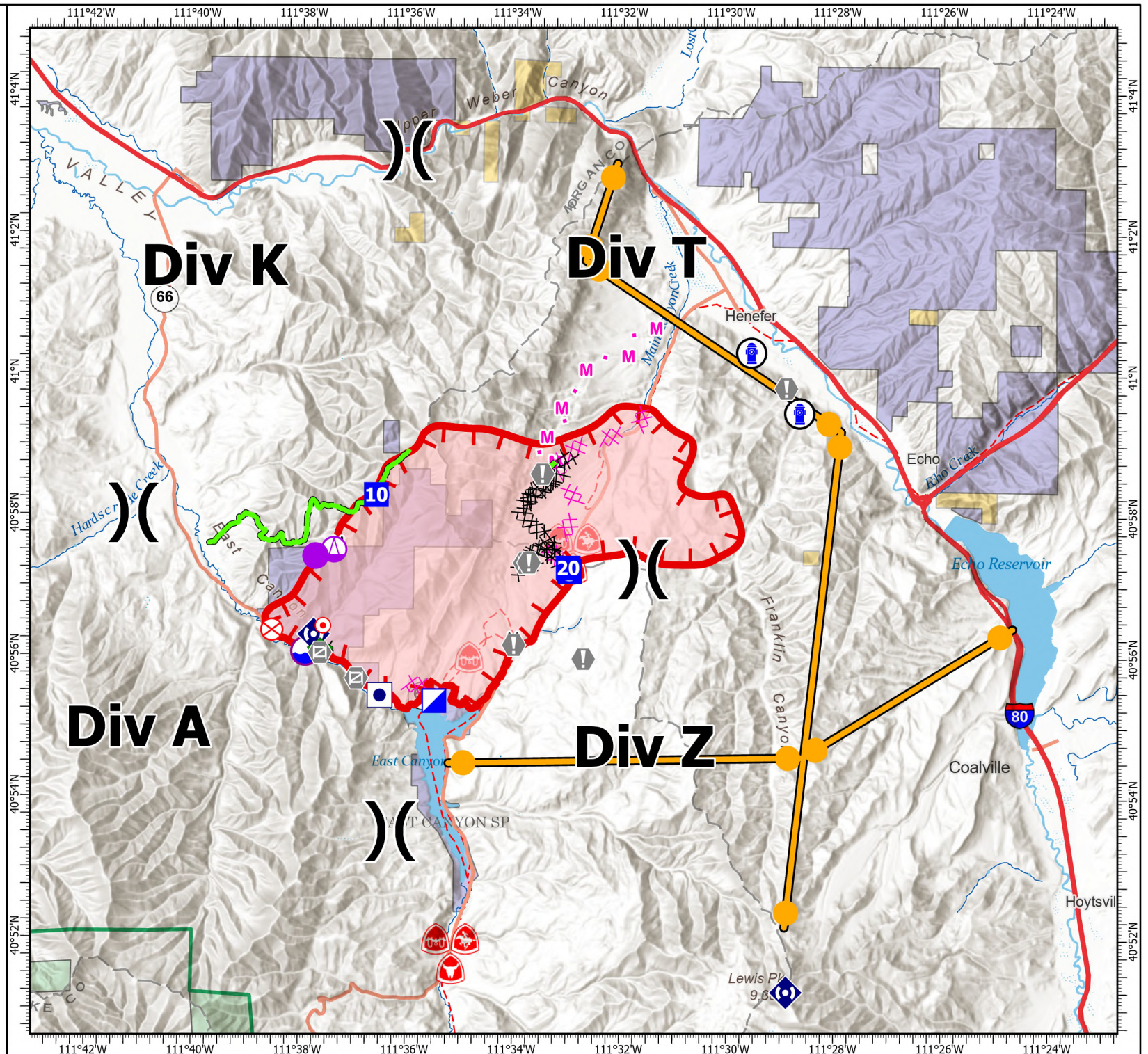

Medical Incident Report

FOR A NON-EMERGENCY INCIDENT, WORK THROUGH CHAIN OF COMMAND TO REPORT AND TRANSPORT INJURED PERSONNEL AS NECESSARY.

FOR A MEDICAL EMERGENCY: IDENTIFY ON SCENE INCIDENT COMMANDER BY NAME AND POSITION AND ANNOUNCE "MEDICAL EMERGENCY" TO INITIATE RESPONSE FROM IMT COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH.

Use the following items to communicate situation to communications/dispatch.

1. CONTACT COMMUNICATIONS / DISPATCH (Verify correct frequency prior to starting report)

Ex: "Communications: Div. Alpha. Stand-by for Emergency Traffic."

2. INCIDENT STATUS: Provide incident summary (including number of patients) and command structure.

Ex: "Communications, I have a Red priority patient, unconscious, struck by a falling tree. Requesting air ambulance to Forest Road 1 at (Lat/Long.) This will be the Trout Meadow Medical, IC is TFLD Jones. EMT Smith is providing medical care."

Severity of Emergency / Transport Priority	☐ RED/PRIORITY 1 Life or limb threatening injury or illness. Evacuation need is IMMEDIATE <i>Ex: Unconscious, difficulty breathing, bleeding severely, 2° - 3° burns more than 4 palm sizes, heat stroke, disoriented.</i> ☐ YELLOW/PRIORITY 2 Serious Injury or illness.
