Spot Forecast for Rocky Canyon...NUIFC

.DISCUSSION...Hot and largely dry conditions are expected to remain in place over the fire area on Friday, with temperatures and humidity going relatively unchanged as compared to Thursday. Winds will be generally light and terrain driven for both Friday and Saturday, with ridges favoring a southwest flow direction. Moisture will begin pushing into northern Utah by Friday afternoon, bringing a slight chance for showers and an isolated thunderstorm after about 1500. A chance for showers will be maintained through the overnight hours, with chances expected to be much higher on Saturday afternoon. Passing showers/ storms will bring potential for gusty and erratic outflow winds in excess of 30 mph each afternoon, with heavy rainfall chances increasing greatly on Saturday. Cooler, more seasonable temperatures and higher humidity will accompany the increased chances for showers and thunderstorms on Saturday.

Sky/weather.....Mostly sunny (25-35 percent cloud cover) then becoming partly cloudy (30-40 percent cloud cover). A slight chance of showers after 1500.

Chance of pcpn.....10 percent.

Chance of lightning.5 percent.

Max temperature.....Lower Elevations: 92-95.

Upper Elevations: 85-88.

Min humidity.....15-20 percent.

Wind (20 ft).....Terrain driven (upslope) 4-7 mph.

Mixing height.....11400 ft AGL (80-90th Percentile).

Transport winds.....Southwest around 9 mph becoming southeast around 12 mph in the afternoon.

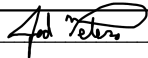

TAKE CARE OF YOURSELF!

MIND, BODY, SPIRIT

Fatigue, Dehydration, and Personal Health Chronic fatigue, dehydration, inadequate nutrition, and poor personal hygiene are additive factors leading to poor individual performance, situational awareness, and decision making.

Accumulated (chronic) Fatigue is defined as fatigue from which normal rest does not produce recovery. It is often caused by extended periods of stress/work with inadequate recovery periods. It affects your ability to make decisions, slows your reaction time, can cause errors in judgment, increases forgetfulness, and reduces productivity. You may also experience:

- Decreased motivation/low morale
- Increased irritability and depression
- Extreme emotional responses
- Confused, poor problem solving
- Poor attention/decisions
- Poor concentration/memory

The most effective remedy is a good night's sleep. 2:1 work rest – max. sleep during rest.

Dehydration can cause rapid heart rate, weakness, excessive fatigue, and dizziness. Drink water with sports drinks (2 or 3 to 1) before, during, and after work. Drink at least 1 quart per hr. (1-2 when engaged in arduous tasks). If you experience signs of dehydration:

Let your supervisor know before more serious conditions develop.

Nutrition – Not usually a problem on fire assignments unless you are on per diem for meals.

Eat well-balanced meals with energy supplements during high exertion periods.

Hygiene – Poor personal hygiene can result in illness and transmission of illness to others.

Wash hands often (especially before eating), cover coughs and sneezes, don't share food/drinks, keep warm and dry. Shower when available, use "bath in a bag" if not.

Mental Well-Being – Excessive stress, anxiety, anguish, or unreasoned fear (False Evidence Appearing Real) diminish clear thinking, positive collaboration and performance capabilities.

Workload management (discuss with supervisor), time to process and consider alternatives, seek other's viewpoints/advice, use After Action Reviews to improve, employ pre-planning scenarios to specify actions ahead of time, use stress management techniques, accept critical incident stress management (defusing, debriefing, follow-up) if helpful.

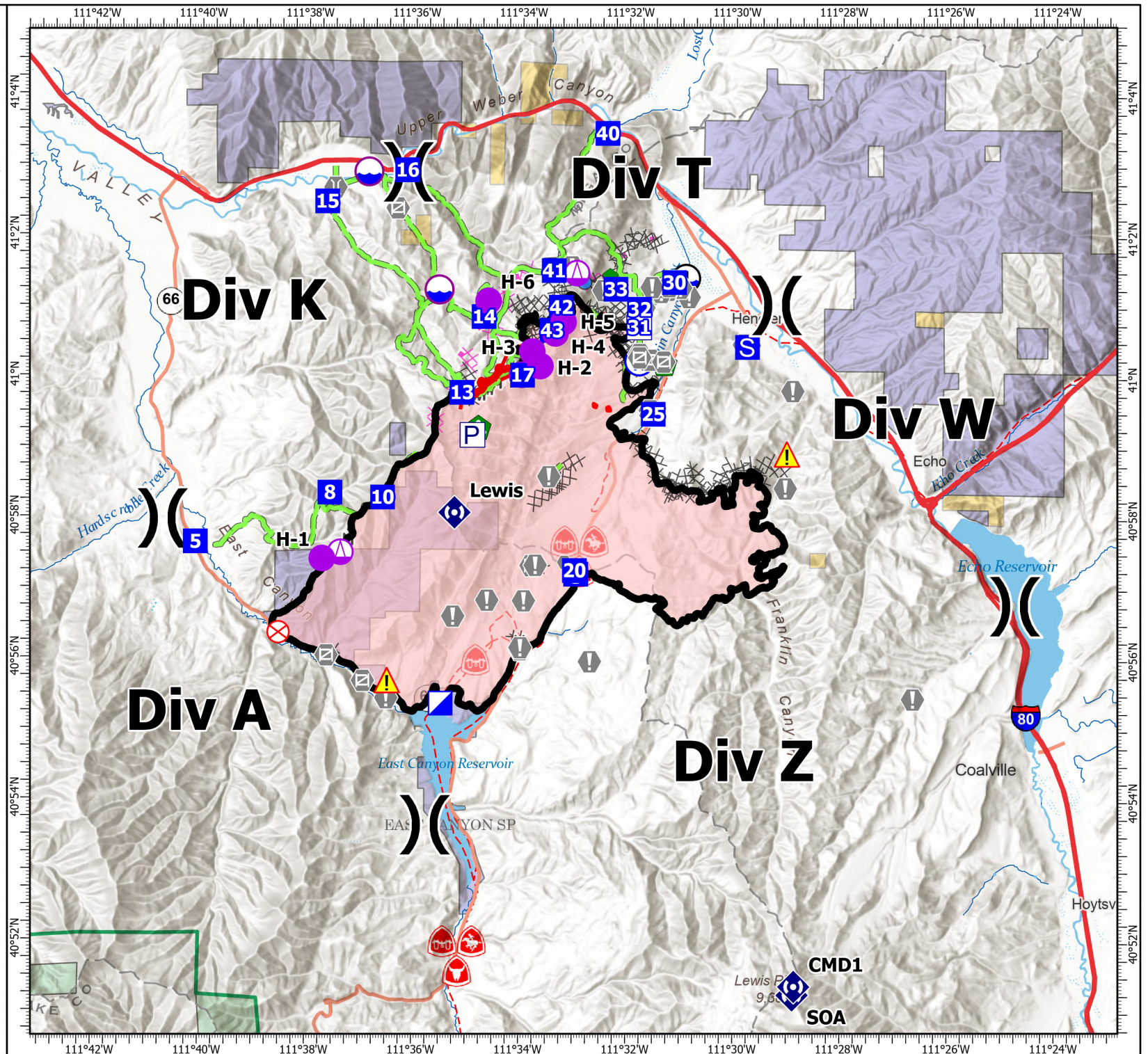

Medical Incident Report

FOR A NON-EMERGENCY INCIDENT, WORK THROUGH CHAIN OF COMMAND TO REPORT AND TRANSPORT INJURED PERSONNEL AS NECESSARY.

FOR A MEDICAL EMERGENCY: IDENTIFY ON SCENE INCIDENT COMMANDER BY NAME AND POSITION AND ANNOUNCE "MEDICAL EMERGENCY" TO INITIATE RESPONSE FROM IMT COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH.
