DISCUSSION

Coverage of showers and storms decreases tomorrow, but enough remnant moisture will be in place to initiate another round of afternoon convection. There may also be lingering showers/storms early Thursday morning from a passing low-pressure system. Conditions continue to dry out as the week progresses, with high pressure driving weather conditions across the region.

THURSDAY

Sky/weather.....Partly sunny (55-65 percent). Slight chance of thunderstorms early in the morning. Chance of showers through the day. Chance of thunderstorms in the afternoon.

CWR.....10 percent.

Min humidity.....36-41 percent.

Max temperature.....80-85.

Wind (20 ft).....Southwest winds 5-10 mph shifting to the west in the afternoon. Gusty and erratic winds expected near thunderstorms.

Smoke dispersal.....Fair.

Mixing height.....4400 ft AGL increasing to 6600 ft AGL in the afternoon.

Transport winds.....West 10 mph.

Chance of thunder...50 percent.

INPUTS

WEATHER SUMMARY:-

Partly sunny Temps: 83-88 degrees Relative Humidity's: 36-41%

Eye-level Winds: SW 5-10 mph, shifting to the west in the afternoon. Showers and thunderstorms after 1200.

OUTPUTS

GENERAL:

Expect the fire behavior today to be moderate with the low winds and higher RH. Expect thunderstorms after noon. Torching and spotting are possible as the fire moves through the pinyon/juniper fuel type.

Probability of ignition is 65% with spotting distances of .1 mile possible.

1 hour fuel moisture: 5%

1000-hour fuels are ~7-9 % and live fuel moistures are at around 80%, ERCs are above the 90th percentile.

SPECIFIC:

All Divisions: The wind will be out of the southwest in the morning, switching to west this afternoon which may pressure the east and north flanks. Head fire max rates of spread are estimated to be 14-27 chains/hour and flames lengths up to 4-6 feet in the grass and brush.

AIR OPERATIONS:

Gusty and erratic winds could develop with the possibility of t-storms and instability in the afternoon.

SAFETY

Keep lookouts posted to watch for t-storm buildup and long-range spotting. Always maintain LCES!

Local Thresholds – **WATCHOUT:** Combinations of any of these factors can greatly increase fire behavior:

*****Note: If you have cell phone coverage and have nothing to return, you will not physically need to come to ICP.*****

After being notified by your supervisor of your tentative release date AND TIME:

Step 1. **Return** all supplies, radios, etc. that were checked out. If you have no items to return, you can complete Finance and Demob virtually. **Make sure to see Logs to get your apparatus inspected before departure if required.**

Step 2. Submit time for all personnel and equipment to Finance via **QR code on front of IAP** or email to: 2026.keystone.finance@firenet.gov.

Step 3. Complete **Demob Checkout Sheet** using QR code. If unable to use, see Demob. Once Demob receives confirmation from Finance and your demob checkout sheet has been electronically submitted, you will be released in the system.

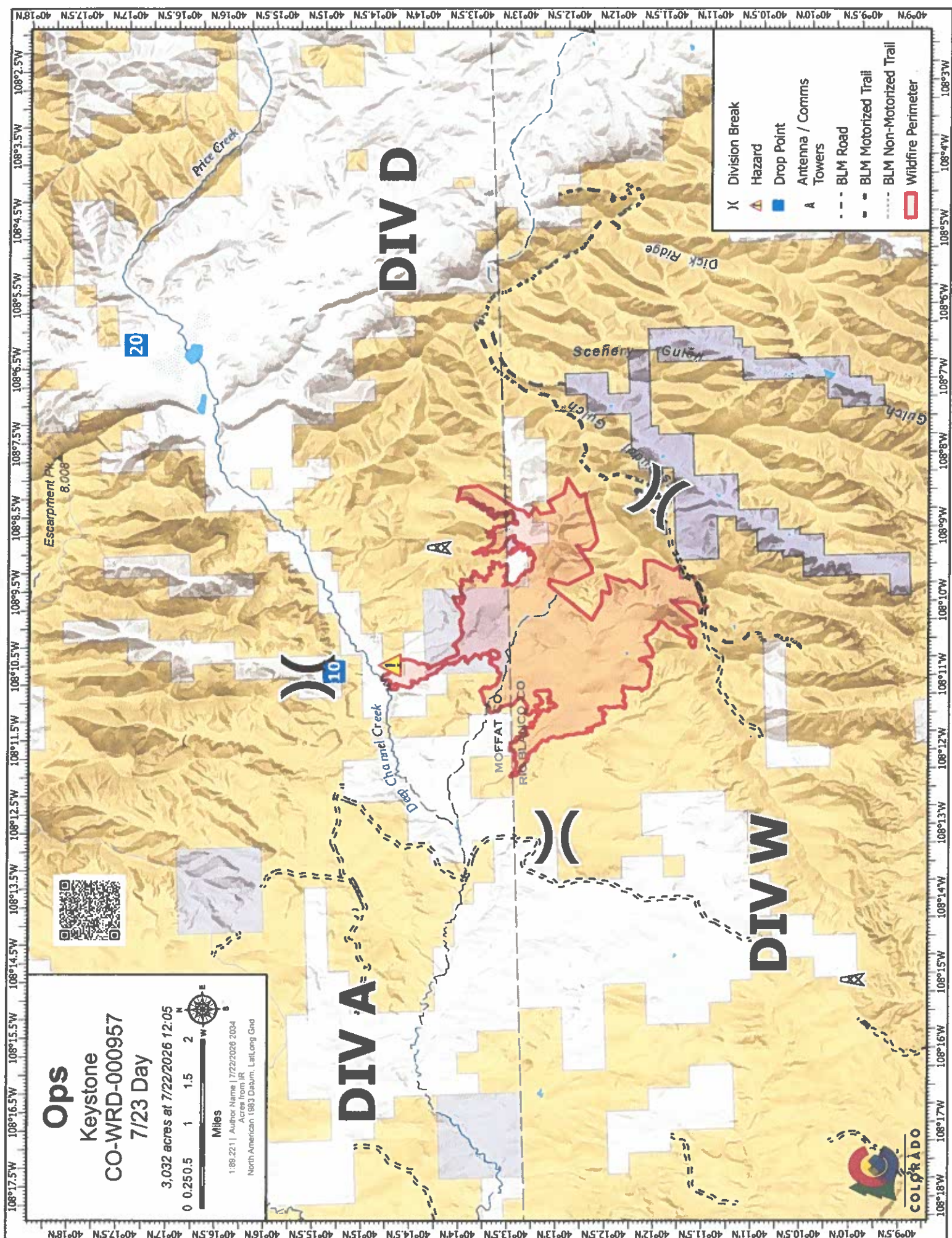

HEALTH AND SAFETY MESSAGE

Firefighter safety comes first on every fire, every time

INCIDENT: Keystone Fire

DATE: 7/23/2026

Shift: 0600-2000

Major Hazards and Risks:

- **EXTREME FIRE BEHAVIOR** – This fire has shown what it can do, so be extra cautious during 2pm-6pm or when outflow winds from thunderstorms are a potential.
- **WILDLIFE ON COUNTYROAD 7/57** – This stretch of road is notorious for large numbers of wildlife causing accidents. Slow down and expect to see wildlife.
- **RATTLESNAKES** – This area is also well known for rattlesnakes. Listen for their rattle signal, slowly walk away, look before step or sit, and give them a wide berth.
- **SPEED ON ALL THE ROADS** – There are ranches and oil & gas workers using the roads too. Be extra mindful of speed on the private roads, so Slow Down.
- **RAIN** – leading to flash flooding or roads and fireline turning very slick leading to sliding off the road or getting stuck.

TRANSITION

As we transition from the Type 4 IC to the Type 3 IMT, safety remains our top priority. Transitions can create opportunities for miscommunication and gaps in situational awareness. Every firefighter and support staff member plays a role in ensuring a safe and smooth handoff. Go slow this morning so you can go fast this afternoon.

Key Safety Considerations:

- Do you know who you are working for?
- Do you have a map?
- Do you know what command and tactical channels you are using?
- Do you know what to do in case of a medical emergency?

Bottom Line: A team transition does not change our commitment to safety. Stay vigilant, stay informed, and continue to look out for each other.

FOR A MEDICAL EMERGENCY: IDENTIFY ON SCENE INCIDENT COMMANDER BY NAME AND POSITION AND ANNOUNCE "MEDICAL EMERGENCY" TO INITIATE RESPONSE FROM IMT COMMUNICATIONS/DISPATCH.

Use the following items to communicate situation to communications/dispatch.

- 1. CONTACT COMMUNICATIONS / DISPATCH** (Verify correct frequency prior to starting report)
Ex: "Communications, Div. Alpha, Stand-by for Emergency Traffic."
- 2. INCIDENT STATUS:** Provide incident summary (including number of patients) and command structure.
Ex: "Communications, I have a Red priority patient, unconscious, struck by a falling tree. Requesting air ambulance to Forest Road 1 at (Lat./Long.) This will be the Trout Meadow Medical, IC is TFLD Jones. EMT Smith is providing medical care."
