WEATHER DISCUSSION: Plenty of Monsoon Moisture – Chances of Wetting Rains Increasing
Fire Weather Conditions Greatly Moderated

Fairly deep monsoon moisture is in place across the Gila, and the mid-level storm-motion flow now seems to be more favorable, with showers and storms now moving from northeast to southwest across the mountains of the Gila. This should mean an increase in rain and storm probability and coverage today. More clouds, and less sun, will keep temperatures lower, and relative humidity higher today. A light southerly wind will continue to pump moisture into the region, increasing potential for heavier wetting rains with today's showers and storms. Daily rain and storm chances will remain quite high through the remainder of the week, and into the weekend, as dewpoint temperatures stay above 45 degrees, with cooler temperatures, and elevated relative humidity minimums near 50 percent. Barring a lengthy break in monsoon conditions sometime during the next month, Southwest Fire Season could be all but done for the 2026 spring/summer fire season.

TODAY'S FORECAST Cloudier, Cooler, and Wetter – Better Rain/Storm Chances

WEATHER: Partly cloudy morning. Building clouds through midday. Becoming mostly cloudy with scattered afternoon showers and thunderstorms. Some storms may bring heavy rain.

MAX TEMPERATURES: (3-5°F cooler) 70-73°F 8400-8700ft

MIN RELATIVE HUMIDITY: (8-12% wetter) 43-48% 8400-8700ft

20 FT Winds: AM: Light east winds 2 to 5 mph.

PM: Southeast to south 5 to 8 mph (gusty and erratic storm outflow winds are possible).

MIXING HGT: 8,500 ft **XPORT:** SSE @ 5 kts **PCPN/STORM CHC:** 80% **CWR:** 60%.

Major Hazards and Risks: DRIVING, HEAVY EQUIPMENT OPERATION, HAZARD TREES, FOOTING, STEEP TERRAIN, ROLLING MATERIAL, AVIATION OPERATIONS, RUGGED ACCESS, CUMULATIVE FATIGUE

- Things you can do to help prevent “Camp Crud”
 - Practice good personnel hygiene and be sure to wash your hands regularly. Utilize fist bumps rather than a handshake when greeting others.
 - When available, use laundry and shower facilities. Being covered in dirt and grime is no longer cool and will not fool others into thinking you’re a better firefighter.
 - Ensure adequate sleep and stay in a tent to help eliminate dust and smoke inhalation. A tent can act as a respiratory barrier.
 - Although the volume of water needed to stay hydrated varies from individual to individual, wildland firefighters need to drink at least 5-6 quarts of fluid per day during hard work. (U. S. Forest Service National Technology and Development Program recommendation.)
 - When coughing up phlegm, avoid spitting in high traffic areas such as on the ground in camp, near sleeping areas, or in other places where cross-contamination on boots and hands can occur.
 - Never allow bottles or cups containing spit to be stored inside a vehicle.

Remember: A clean crew is a healthy crew and a healthy crew is an available crew.

6. INSTRUCTIONS AND ASSIGNMENTS NOT CLEAR

Distracted Driving

There are three main types of distractions:

1. Manual: taking your hands off the wheel
2. Visual: taking your eyes off the road
3. Cognitive: taking your mind off driving

- Driving while using a cell phone reduces brain activity associated with driving (e.g., spatial processing that helps drivers remember and make sense of the objects they observe on the street) by 37 percent.
- Phone conversations of any type increase reaction times and increase variations in speed, lane deviations, and steering wheel control.
- When conversing on mobile devices, either hand-held or hands-free, drivers increase their risk of a crash two to four times.
- Texting takes your eyes off the road for 4.6 seconds. At 55 MPH, that’s like driving an entire football field blindfolded.
- Talking to a passenger while driving is significantly safer than talking on a cell phone, a University of Utah study found. Passengers, unlike cell phone conversations, can make the driver aware of changing road conditions they might not see and can stop the conversation if traffic conditions warrant.
